YORKSHIRE, Ia.—When the recent cyclonic storm, which left farms in the vicinity of Yorkshire, Neola and Pesta crippled and denuded, had passed, the first organized relief in clearing the wreckage and offering shelter was given by the American Legionnaires of the Ninth District under the direction of Hugo Geiger, district commander.

"To bring order out of chaos more than 400 legionnaires invaded the Yorkshire storm sector and cleaned up twenty-five farms with a three-mile radius," said Commander Geiger. "Bankers, farmers and business men, all legionnaires, pitched in with a will."

"The efficient work of Ed Burns, commander of the legion post at Neola, won him a headline in a Council Bluffs newspaper, reading: 'Burns of Legion a Wizard at Getting Things Done.'"

Dinner: Broiled lamb chops, new potatoes in cream sauce, string beans, Roman salad, current berry pie, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

One cup brown sugar, ½ cup butter, 2½ cups oatmeal, 2½ cups flour, ½ cup water, 1 teaspoon soda, ½ teaspoon salt.

cup sugar, 1½ cups water. Cream butter and beat in sugar. Mix oatmeal, flour, soda and salt. Add alternately with water to first mixture. Knead until smooth. Roll on a floured molding board, making a sheet one-fourth inch thick. Spread half with filling, cover with remaining dough and cut in narrow bars. Bake in a moderate oven for 15 minutes.

To make the filling, stone the dates and cook in sugar and water until thick.
