ARMY LIFE IN U. S. DESCRIBED

WASHINGTON. (By the Associated Press)—The following is the first of a series of six articles describing activities of the Army of the United States during the summer months of 1925, given to the Associated Press by General John J. Pershing, author of the series.

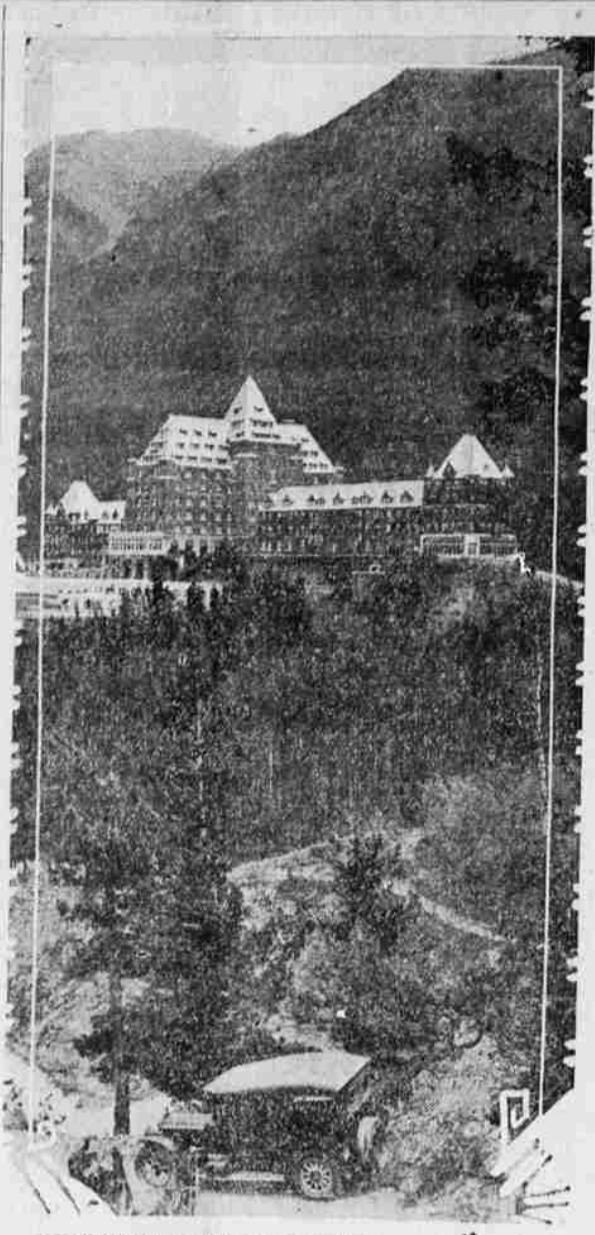
A large number of young men in the prime of life will be out of doors this summer, devoting from two to six weeks of their time to military training. This military training began with the closing of our colleges and schools in June and will end about the middle of September, with July and August as the busiest months.

Most of these young men in uniform will be civilian, spending their vacation periods in their country's service. We shall have the maximum number of civilian soldiers to receive military training since the World War. Prior to 1917 there was scarcely any of this sort of work. Our history has been one of unpreparedness with its important wars, not to mention the skirmishes involved in winning this continent from its original inhabitants, and the people seem determined to have a reasonable number of trained men available should another emergency arise. The various groups in this age to place those things in the house.

People ask, why does the cost of a building amount to such an enormous figure, just one illustration will answer that in full. Nineteen out of every 20 men were raised in a house when boys did not have in excess of the total building 800 square feet of floor space for all five rooms, today, one room has an average of seven hundred and twenty square feet of floor space, and all other rooms have been increased in size and materially and accordingly that's one of the big reasons why your home today costs you more money than the homes of a few years ago. There are other things that enter into the buildings of today that you did not have a few years ago, but the largest item is the size of the house compared with the size of the houses a few years ago.

Our new citizen army, created by the National Defense Act of 1920, is the logical product of our bitter World War experience. In unpreparedness, it will number in summer training this year in the United States a very small Regular Army contingent of 31,000 men, National Guardsmen Reserves, 17,000, or about one-sixth of the total number of reserve officers. These three components constitute what is called the Army of the United States.

In addition, there will also be some 8,000 young men from our colleges and schools in Reserve Officer Training Corps Camps. None of these, however, will be members of our new citizen army, as they are merely its pupils, learning the practical lessons of constructive citizenship and patriotism through preparing themselves as

individuals to fulfill the most sacred of all citizenship duties—defense of home and country. They can qualify, if they wish, to be officers and noncommissioned officers in our new citizen army, by completing certain prescribed courses. This action is left entirely to their decision, as the training exacts no obligations from them.

This, briefly, is a description of what some people have been pleased to criticize as "new militarism of the United States." It is true that the citizen Army of the United States, composed in the main of young men who only train intensively from two to six weeks during the summer months, is the largest measure of military defense this nation has ever had. Before the World War there was in addition to our small, but efficient Regular Army, only the forty-nine separate and distinct national guards of our several states, but they were in such poor shape that they had to be reorganized and trained for many months before they could be used in that conflict. To all intents and purposes, the Organized Reserves, the Citizens' Military Training Camps and Reserve Officers' Training Corps are new elements in our available military forces.

No further proof of the very democratic character of our new army is needed to satisfy any fair-minded person that it could not be readily used for aggression. It would be many months before our civilian soldiers could stand the rigors of a military campaign.

A visit to any camp this summer should convince any fair-minded person that the young men in attendance are most interested

in keeping our national peace and in obeying our country's laws. They have no desire to bring war nor break international agreements. They believe in law and order and they themselves are the surety that law and order will be maintained and honorable peace preserved.

By way of contrast with our summer training activities, I would like to call attention to other lands than ours. Our total military establishment is only 1.6 per cent of the organized military forces of the world, and 2.2 per cent of the organized military forces to be found in Europe alone. The active armies of Europe total 3,735,562, while our Regular Army numbers less than 125,000. The organized military forces in Europe aggregate 18,627,186, a larger number of men, thoroughly trained soldiers than this nation could produce if all its available manpower was organized and trained.

Our military system is based upon the theory of a relatively small regular force supplemented by a partially trained body of civilians, no organized that in the event of an emergency they could be given the additional training necessary to make them efficient soldiers in the minimum of time. It is a system which from its very nature is wholly devoid of the slightest tinge of militarism. In reality, it is just the opposite, because it is so essentially democratic.

There is no military system similar to ours in character. There is not even any country around for equipping our citizen army with those maintained by the other nations. The more than eight-million soldiers of Europe have received at least two solid years of intensive instruction in all of a few weeks. The nearest approach to our system is the Swiss, except that it has compulsory instead of voluntary training.

LONDON (AP).—More than \$20,000 worth of unique stamps have been discovered under romantic circumstances in the attic of a filled woman's home in fashionable Mayfair. OXFORD LEADS GROTES PORTRAITS TO HOLLAND
OXFORD, Eng. (AP).—The Oxford House of Congress has been persuaded to lend to the Dutch government the two proposed portraits of Hugo Grotius, the founder of international law, which have hung in the Bodleian library for 200 years. It has long been the rule that no book may go out of the library, even at the request of the king himself, or on any manner of condition or bond, but while books contained pictures often enough, yet pictures are not books and so have been held to fall without the rule.

These portraits are alike in general features, showing a middle-aged man, ruddy and full-faced with brown hair and mustache and small pointed beard. Both resemble the authentic portraits of the great lawyer, poet and theologian.

The history of the portraits, prior to their coming to the university in 1727, is not clear.
