Commission Urges Selected Immigration for Queensland

BRISBANE (AP)—The need for the selection of immigrants, deportation of convicted aliens and the keeping of a record of all aliens in the commonwealth is stressed in a report by T. A. Ferry, under-chief secretary and commissioner of prices, who was recently appointed head of a Royal Commission to inquire into the social and economic effect of the increase in number of aliens in North Queensland.

Mr. Ferry suggests a stricter medical examination and expresses the view that the existence of foreign clubs is undesirable. The present alien influx is largely from Sicily and Northern Italy, the emigrants going into the sugar industry.

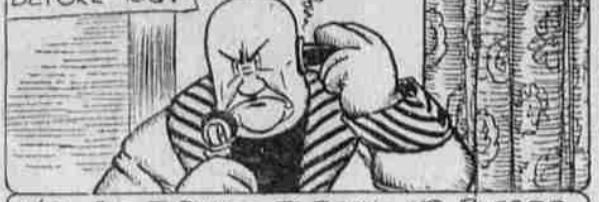

Colored Film Photography Used In "Cytherea"

The next marked advance in the motion picture art will constitute the more general use of color photography in its various treatments.

For years the use of color in photoplay productions has been the exception. There have been short subjects in color which, however, have been looked upon as novelties. In photoplays, an occasional touch of color has been employed to enhance the beauty of a scene. This, however, has generally had an unfavorable effect upon the black and white scenes, which were made less effective by contrast.

The effect was the same as the use of soft-focus views here and there in a photoplay which practice has now been practically discontinued, for the reason that the contrast between the soft-focus effects and the sharp views tended to make the production an assortment of different photographs rather than a smooth method of telling a story.

In other words, the illusion was interrupted. The mixed use of treatments made one conscious of photographic tricks instead of keeping one's mind on the story. Photography should be used to enhance a story or a situation and not to overwhelm it. At least as far as a photoplay production is concerned.

In "Cytherea," Goddess of Love, I have attempted to capitalize on the very thing which color photography has had in telling the story in a photoplay. The contrast between the colored scenes and the black-and-white scenes enhances my story value, making it strong and vivid. The lovers in the story dream of Cuba as a land of colorful beauty.

Their dream is shown in all its attractive colors. When they arrive in Cuba they find it hot and drab, just the opposite to the dream. To register this contrast most effectively, we actually show their dream in all its colorful beauties. The reality in black and white is therefore rendered with much greater force than if both the dream and the actuality were shown in black and white.

It is my belief that color will play a most important part in the photoplays. This will prove only one of many advantages in the use of color. We have merely scratched the surface of color photography. One producer has just finished a production which will be colored in its entirety. This will prove another interesting experiment.

Others are devoting more time to the thought of color in production than ever before. It is plainly evident that we must look to the use of color photography for our next great step in the progress of motion pictures, and it is also apparent that the coming year will see the first signs of greater development of this factor in the film art than ever before.

"Cytherea," a First National release, will be shown at the Arcade Theatre on Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

Bobbed Hair Bandit Cannot Resist Lure Of Pretty Clothes.

A new type of crook play, with more punch than "Kiek In" and more tense situations than "With-in The Law" comes to the Shorty theatre today and tomorrow when Evelyn Brent's second starring vehicle, "Sally Stacking Salt," enjoys its local premiere.

Cramped with action and thrills of a melodramatic order and enlivened with the touches of comedy, the new Gothic production provides a delightful form of entertainment. It is a picture that audiences will long remember and the story, which was written especially for Miss Brent by E. Richard Sawyer, offers the new star what is undoubtedly the best assignment. Robert Ellis and Earl McCall head a fine supporting cast which has evidently been selected with rare judgment down to the veriest extra.

As a matter of fact the young man is the son of the owner, and he is hugely amused at the girl's efforts to pawn herself off as his sister. Mutual revelation of identity follows, and with her promise to "go straight," the boy offers her a job. Much to his surprise she shows up to claim it, and in turn, is eventually responsible for saving him from a worse fate than a mere jail term.

Director Tod Browning has done clever work in interpreting a story which jumps from thrill to thrill like a nervous chamouls on a cable mountain. The production has been costumed and mounted beautifully.

A two-reel comedy is also being shown.
