## Billy Evans Says

**COLLEGE BASEBALL.**  
During four years of college baseball, Owen Carroll, Holy Cross pitching sensation, lost only two games of ball. He won the surprising number of 18.

In less than two weeks of big league baseball, the same Owen Carroll has lost as many battles as he did during his entire college career.

Only the bats of his teammates kept the number of defeats from being three. In his debut he left the game with the score 3 to 7 against him, but Detroit managed to win out.

Disquestionably there is a wide difference between the college and big league brand of baseball. Perhaps no one is better able to appreciate this fact than Owen Carroll.

One answer is that big league batters swing at few bad balls while the college athletes go after many.

**BOASTS GOOD CURVE.**  
Carroll has a good curve ball. He made suckers out of most college players with the low hook. This style delivery is most effective at the knee or below.

If the batter waits the pitcher out, it is obvious that all deliveries below the knee will be called balls. Carroll tells me that with two strikes on a college player a curve ball wasted low would invariably cause the batter to go after it with poor results.

The low curve is a style of delivery that major league batters are inclined to pass up. Occasionally they are fooled in following the low curve but more often they pass it up and get out.

**Inability to get the batters to bite at the low curve has been one of the several handicaps that Carroll has suffered.**

**LOW BALL HANDICAP.**  
I happened to be one of the umpires in Carroll's first two starts. In his first game, against Boston, his general style with the exception of his fast ball impressed me.

In his second game, against St. Louis, he showed me a much better fast ball. It had what baseball players are pleased to term a "hop." That is, the ball raises slightly as it reaches the batter.

Perhaps too much was expected of Carroll because of his marvelous performances as a collegian. Possibly he was started a trifle too soon. No doubt his lack of knowledge of the strength and weakness of the different batters has handicapped him.

It is a matter of record that Carroll, who as a collegian lost only two ball games in six, has been unable to finish any one of his first three starts as a big leaguer.

In none of his games has he been hit hard. Faulty support, coupled with timely hitting on the part of the opposition, has been his downfall in each instance.

## Jack Dempsey Ready To Meet Gene Tunney

**NEW YORK (AP)**—Jack Dempsey, world heavyweight champion, and his wife, returned from Europe this afternoon on the liner Hamonic.

Dempsey said he was prepared to fight once this year, probably in September, with Gene Tunney, American light heavyweight champion, as his opponent.

Asked about a fight with Harry Mills, Dempsey said he would be ready for him next year.

Dempsey said he had an offer from Floyd Fitzsimmons for a fight at Michigan City, Ind., on Labor day with Hartley Madden as an opponent but wanted time to consider this before accepting.

Relative to his status with the New York state athletic commission, Dempsey said he expected to straighten matters out with the commission some time next week.

He said the contract with Kenner did not expire until September 1, 1925, and that Kenner would book any matches for him.

The champion appeared in good shape although tired from the long trip. He expects to remain in New York for about a week, after which he will leave for the Pacific coast to close up some business arrangements and to see his parents in Salt Lake city.

**Maoris Trace Race Ancestry to Hawaii**  
**HONOLULU (AP)**—Many of the Maoris of Australia, recently that their race had its origin in Hawaii centuries ago, it has been revealed by Hattie Jacobs, a prominent Maori. He is here with a group of Mormon church workers from Australia to visit the famous Mormon temple at Laie, Oahu.

Jakobs said that he had traced his ancestry back to a certain Maori of Hawaii, who ruled the island of Hawaii. After a devastating war in which Henna was defeated and forced to flee from the island for his life, he had a few companions set sail for the south in huge war canoes. Maori legends have it that they landed in New Zealand and lived there for several years. Later Henna returned to Hawaii, where the residents worshipped him as their supreme being.

They had a large temple in the Puhi district of Hawaii, but later turned to the worship of other gods. Henna returned to New Zealand and many people accompanied him. He also took the image of To.

Tole, the Hawaiian goddess of fire, became displeased with the Hawaiians, who were worshipping many deities, and vented her anger by covering their lands and temple with lava, the legends say. This would account for the ancient lava flows from Mauna Kea and Mauna Loa.

Jakobs said the Maoris had established the names of the canoes in which their ancestors went from Hawaii to New Zealand.

**LONDON (AP)**—Diamonds as large as basenits in settings for men have attracted much attention here lately where jewelry of this kind is sold chiefly to Americans, Englishmen, excepting in rare instances, never wear diamonds, especially as rings, and on this account they never the seen in the jewelry shops until spring when the tourist season opens.

Dealers here say the Americans are buying fewer diamonds than formerly. This is attributed to the fact that the stones are approximately as dear here as in the United States, now that the pound sterling is virtually at par, and in addition purchasers are expected to pay the 50 per cent duty which is levied on the other side.

## Expecting Bigger Yield From Baku Oil Fields

**BAKU, (AP)**—On the occasion of the fifth anniversary of the Baku oil fields, the Soviet press gave some details of the present state and productivity of the oil fields and outlined the program of their future development.

The Baku oil fields, which before the revolution belonged to 270 different owners, are now united under one management. The yield of oil which in 1920 was as low as 10,000,000 pounds a month, has now been brought up to almost 20,000,000 pounds, which is approximately the pre-war standard. There are now in exploitation 21,000 wells.

Last year Russia exported from Baku 22,000,000 pounds of oil. It is expected that during the coming year not less than 240,000,000 will be obtained.

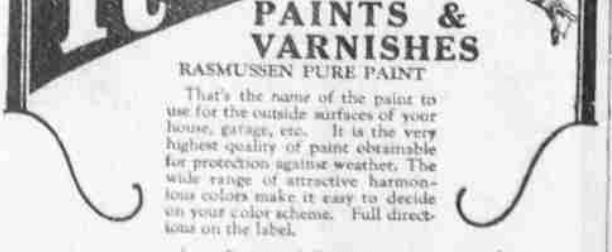
New equipment and machinery were bought in America this year, and the methods of obtaining oil have been entirely revolutionized. At present the government is embarking upon a costly program of building an additional pipe line connecting Baku with Batum, on which it will spend more than \$10,000,000. Part of the order for pipes is expected to be placed abroad, probably in America. The scheme will be financed by the state oil trust itself without any subsidy from the government.
