Hints for the Housewife

UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE

This unusual cake can be made with any number of fruits, but here we give you a novel one. Then, too, few fruits are more entirely beneficial to the system, or more simply and pleasantly wholesome in effect than pineapple, or more easily digested.

Clean four tablespoonsful of butter and one cupful sugar together. Add three egg yolks, well beaten, one-half table-spoonful salt and two table-spoonfuls baking powder sifted with one and one-half cupfuls flour. Then add one-quarter cupful milk, and mix the three egg whites, stiffly beaten. Place a layer of sliced, drained, canned pineapple or fresh pineapple that has been sugared and allowed to draw juice, in the bottom of a well-buttered deep enameled ware cake pan. The vitriolic surface of enameled ware will not become affected by the fruit color and will preserve the delicate color and flavor of the pineapple. Fill in the vacant spaces around the slices with smaller pieces of pineapple until the bottom of the pan is covered. Pour in the cake batter and bake in a moderate oven for forty-five minutes. When done turn it out with bottom side up and fill the center of the pineapple slices with marshmallows or candied cherries. Top with whipped cream.

Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast—Orange juice, creamed dried beef on toast, graham popovers, milk, coffee.
Luncheon—Jellied veal loaf, brown bread and butter sandwiches, ginger cookies, lemonade.
Dinner—Lake trout stuffed and baked, scalloped potatoes, butter string beans, cucumber salad, peach shortcake, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

With the exception of the stuffing in the fish, the cucumber salad and the peach shortcake there are no dishes suggested in this day's menu unsuitable for a child as young as four years. Home-made lemonade can be given to a four-year-old child occasionally if the drink is noticed and contains only the juice of fresh lemons, sugar and water.

Jellied Veal Loaf
Knuckle of veal, 1-2 pounds lean veal, 2 hard-cooked eggs, 1 medium-sized onion, 2 table-spoonfuls minced parsley, 2 gram teaspoons salt, 1-2 teaspoon pepper.
The knuckle must be opened in several places. Have the butcher saw through the bone. Wipe with a damp cloth and put into a kettle with the lean meat and onion. Cover with boiling water and simmer over a low fire until tender. Remove meat from liquor and chop very finely. Reduce stock to 1-1 1/4 cups and strain. Put slices of the eggs in the bottom of a mold. Sprinkle with parsley and cover with a layer of meat. Season with salt and pepper. Continue layer for layer of eggs and meat until all is used. Season each layer with salt and pepper and a sprinkling of parsley. The last layer should be of meat. Pour over strained stock, press with a

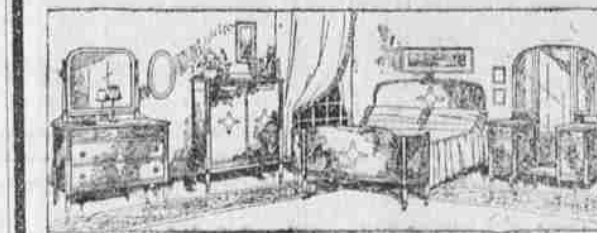

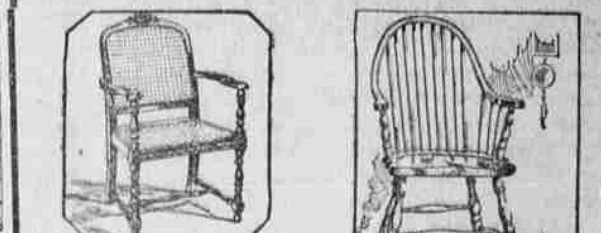
