Japan to Study Rice Growing and Agriculture in America TOKYO, (AP)—The department of agriculture is planning to send an expert to the United States to study and report on the agricultural situation, especially with regard to the cultivation of Japanese rice in American farms. The output of Japanese grain in America is said to have been on the increase up to 1923, when 270,000,000 pounds were produced. The subsequent decrease is attributed to the rise in dollar exchange against monies of importing countries. In addition to studying the rice cultivation situation in America, the agricultural department investigator will also look into the system of selling farm products and the supervision of traffic bearing up agriculture.

Membership of British Trade Unions Shows Large Decrease LONDON, (AP)—The annual report of the General Federation of Trade Unions shows a total membership of 226,216, the smallest recorded since 1912. The decrease last year was 89,724. The receipts, \$288,456, shows a decrease of \$16,108 from the previous year. W. A. Appleton, secretary of the federation, discussing the situation, said: "The greatest of the losses arise from amalgamations and loss of membership in the unions themselves, and some arise from the poverty of unions who through unemployment find their contributions smaller. In some cases they find themselves handicapped through war-time commitments to expenditures which after war-time incomes cannot meet."

Germany Holds Sugar Exhibit MAGDEBURG, Germany (AP)—So steadily has the sugar industry grown in Germany that the nation has been in a position to export rather than import the product for 50 years. The year 1925-26 was the record year, during which more than one million tons of beet sugar were exported. An exhibition, depicting the progress of the industry, was recently held in Magdeburg. While sugar was one of the best export articles before the war, the exports have fallen off considerably since that time.

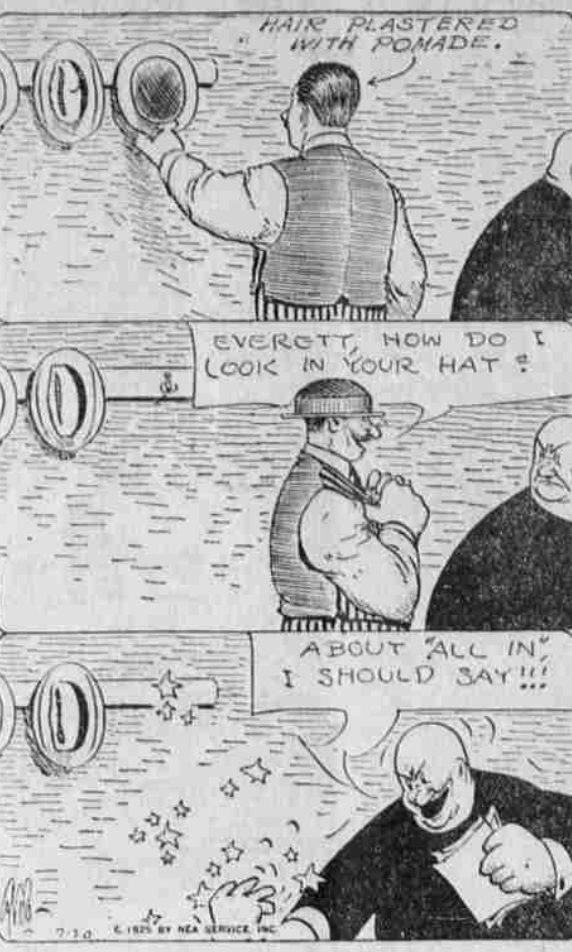

Fault Under River's Mouth Is Blamed for Earthquake in Japan

YOKYO, (AP)—A scientific opinion on the recent earthquake in the Tajima region of Japan, which took several hundred lives, has been submitted to Governor Hiratake of Hyogo-ken by the Nakamura of the Tokyo Imperial university, the leading seismologist of the empire. In his report Dr. Nakamura stated: "The existence of an earthquake belt running from Amori, in the northeast to the neighborhood of Sakai town, in Fukuji prefecture on the Japan sea coast, has been well known, but in this zone no strong shock has ever been recorded. On the south coast, Japanese sea coast, including Hiroshima, Toki, Idzumi, Iwami and Oki provinces, also no disturbance of importance has taken place since the establishment of Tokyo university. "I am inclined to attribute the origin of the recent destructive quake to a deep fault below the mouth of the Maruyama river, as mentioned by others who have inspected the Tajima region. There might have been a local absorption of strata near Kumihama, in Western Tango province, and any immediate destructive shock is hardly conceivable in the vicinity of the river mouth mentioned. Anyhow, a sounding of the war-bottom near the river mouth might furnish valuable data."

Profiteering Guide Is Fined in German Court

POTSDAM, (AP)—Six dollars in too much for any guide to charge for taking tourists through Sans Souci Palace and other sights of Potsdam, in the opinion of the court of appeals. Guides for tourists are not a luxury, as held by the lower court whose decision was reversed, but a daily necessity and therefore cannot command fancy prices. The case arose out of a difference some months ago between a party of Englishmen and a Potsdam guide named Max Schulz. The guide had charged 25 marks for taking the party around, which upon the Englishmen, appeared to the courts. The lower court believed that anybody who can afford a guide is rich enough to pay whatever the guide may charge. The state's attorney held, however, that Germany and especially Potsdam have every reason to encourage the traveling public and that overcharges like these were calculated to make people shun Potsdam, thereby ruining its tourist business. The higher court agreed with the state's attorney, reversed the

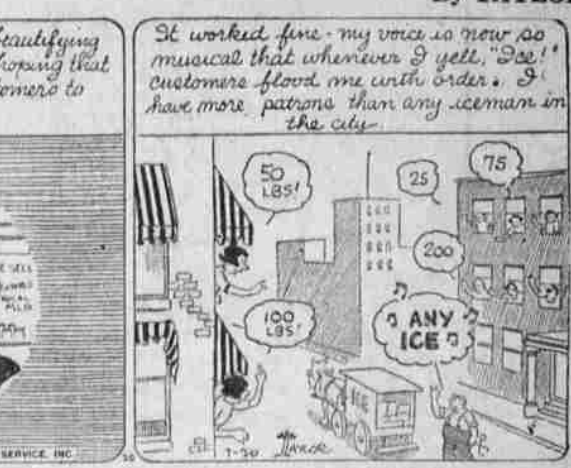
