## Pork Barrel Methods Old, Letters Disclose

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP)—Evidence that the "pork barrel" was in operation more than 100 years ago are shown in the efforts of Nathaniel Pope, then secretary of the Illinois territory, to secure a home rent from Albert Gallatin, secretary of the United States Treasury. Letters between the two have been discovered by the state archivist department and are being bound.



The first letter was written by Pope to Gallatin, May 11, 1809, transmitting his expense vouchers, "I wish to deal candidly with you," Pope said. "I have lived in a house belonging to my wife's father (Najar Backus), who certainly would never have charged me rent. But if a friend should furnish the secretary with an office for nothing, it being a person-

at favor, it is no argument against his charging the government a reasonable price for occupation."

Pope apparently used his home for an office and asked the secretary of the treasury to pay him office rent of \$12 a month. He asked for \$150 for "contingent expenses."

Gallatin answered him June 8, and requested that Pope's father-in-law sign vouchers for the office rent and added with a touch of sarcasm that his father-in-law might afterward "make a present of the money to yourself or any other person." He added, however, that \$40 per annum is considered the highest sum which ought to be allowed for rent of an office.

Pope replied that he thought \$5 was the minimum he should be allowed for office rent. He said he believed the secretary should have two rooms, "one to lodge in and the other for the public papers of his office."

The compromise was finally made at \$5 a month and Pope, perhaps a little incensed at the conservative policy of Gallatin, immediately began another controversy with him as to whether the secretary had to supply Governor Edwards of the Illinois territory with stationery.

## Thief Cleverly Cuts Matched Strips from 2 Valued Tapestries

WEIMAR (AP)—Two valuable Gobelin tapestries of the Wartburg, dating from the 15th century, have been mutilated by unknown thieves with the obvious intention of selling abroad the excised strips as one piece of tapestry. After the revolution both carpets, which belonged to the Grand Ducal House of Saxony, were included in the list of "national works of art of value not to be sold abroad." Recently, in spite of the protest of the Wartburg Foundation, the lord chamberlain of the Grand Ducal House sold the two tapestries to an art collector in Cologne. As they were not being sold to a foreign buyer, the protest of the Wartburg Foundation proved futile.

The new owner thereupon sent them to the Kaiser Friedrich museum of Berlin, for the purpose of obtaining Dr. Demmler's expert opinion on their exact historical significance and value. He decided that both Gobelines were of about the middle of the 15th century. Both represent the "Conquest of Love's Castle" in legend, and both are 85 centimeters long, one being 2.24 meters in width and the other 2.26 meters. It was discovered, however, that a strip of 30 centimeters in width had been cut from one Gobelin, while from the other a strip 60 centimeters wide was missing.

The thief performed the excision so cleverly, however, that both missing strips can be readily combined to form a common design.

The Cologne art collector resuscitated his purchase. The sequel of it all is a big stir in the Thuringian diet. The Social Democrats protested that no appropriate steps have been taken by the government to recover the missing parts. The Lord Chamberlain has published a communication in which he calls attention to the legitimacy of the sale and threatens to prosecute anyone insinuating that the tapestries were mutilated with the connivance of any member of the Grand Ducal Household.

## Autumn Leipsic Fair Aims to Surpass All Previous Exhibitions

LEIPSIK (AP)—The coming Leipsic fair to be held from August 20 to September 5 promises to surpass any previous Leipsic exhibition. It is expected the attendance will be nearly double that of the spring fair, at which there were more than 150,000 business men from all parts of the world, with 14,000 exhibitors from 15 countries.

One of the features of the coming fair will be the huge underground exhibition hall, generally considered a technical world's wonder. has been materially enlarged by two wings each two stories high. In order to furnish the necessary space for the erection of a number of new exhibition buildings, the municipality of Leipsic has placed a further area of 130,000 square meters at the disposal of the administrators of the fair. This permits sufficient space for the construction of a special freight station.

There is also a plan on foot to have foreign firms display their exhibits in special halls in a "Street of Nations."

The magnitude of the Leipsic Fair has made a division into two sections necessary. "The General Sample Exhibit" and "The Technical and Constructive Exhibit." The latter exhibition will continue four days longer than the former and will be arranged in 15 halls. "The Sample Exhibition" will be contained in 30 halls and buildings.
