50 FARMERS VIEW CROPS IN VALLEY

(Continued from Page One.) by side but at their present state of development were difficult to tell which will prove superior. From indications the Soft Federation is not a wheat that does itself justice from the standpoint of appearance.

Grain Crops Viewed
The Clark Brothers ranch was visited and the sweet clover seed and crop examined and then the party drove to the South McKennon place. Mr. McKennon's potato crop from certified seed was examined and the methods of planting and cultivating were explained. The barley and oat crops grown by Mr. McKennon also came in for their share of attention.

At the W. P. Lindseter ranch the Forty-foot wheat and Hybrid 122 fields were inspected and discussed. From McKennon's the excursion proceeded to the Alec McKennie place where four different methods of combating the wild morning glory vines were being tried. The clean cultivation and alfalfa methods seemed to be the most effective with the sun flowers in third place and the millet a poor fourth.

Dinner Near Allet
Dinner was eaten at the J. A. Gaskill ranch near Allet. Coffee and ice cream were served by Mr. and Mrs. Gaskill and the guests brought their own lunches. The Hard and Soft Federation wheat plots at the Gaskill place were examined after dinner. These were of special interest for the reason that four different types of fertilizer had been used. These were: commercial fertilizer, barnyard manure and Swift's Red River D, a patented, mixed fertilizer.

The final stopping place on the itinerary for the day was the Union Experiment Station. The party went through the station, and inspected the different varieties of oats, spring grain, fall grain and other crops under cultivation.
