BERLIN (AP)—Recent savings bank figures show that the Germans are beginning to save again and in the past year and a half the number of depositors has grown rapidly. During the inflation period no one in Germany thought of saving money.

**Breakfast**—Cubed cantaloupe, cereal, thin cream, crisp granular toast, milk, coffee.

**Luncheon**—Jellied houlton, crisp crackers, cottage cheese, brown bread, cup custard, milk, tea.

**Dinner**—Watermelon cocktail, broiled porterhouse steak, creamed potatoes, buttered peas, sliced tomatoes, raspberry ice, sponge cake, white bread, milk, coffee.

## PLANNING FOR BUYERS' WEEK

PORTLAND, Ore. (Special)—Five gala days and five equally delightful nights are being planned by the executive committee that is in charge of Portland's 12th annual Buyers' Week, August 2-6, for visiting merchants. E. A. Spencer, chairman of the committee, aided by an active entertainment group, is working hard to give the buyers the best time ever arranged at any similar trade event anywhere.

On the night the week opens, Monday, August 3, a reception to the outside merchants and their wives will be held on the mezzanine floor of the Multnomah Hotel. It is billed as "A Night of the Orient." It will resemble a colorful carnival in the romantic east. Hand-carved Chinese and Japanese decorations will be used, heliostats operated by Portland Chinese families, being loaned for the occasion. Thousands of lanterns will be hung in the two ballrooms and the tea garden. Refreshments, too, will be oriental in character.

The Oaks Park will be the rallying point for the outside merchants Tuesday night. Special trains will take them out to the local Coast Island and they will spend two hours going through the various trolley rides and other amusements, everything being free to the guests by reason of special coupons good for all Oaks attractions.

The visitors will be divided into two parties on Wednesday night. Ladies among the merchants will be guests at a theater party at the Baker, where the Famous Taylor players will present a special play for their entertainment.

The men will go to the Armory where an elaborate spectacle, never before presented on the Pacific coast, will be produced for them. "Nymphs of the Woods," is the title of the show and a woodland glade will be set up in the Armory for the revel. This promise to be an unique amusement feature of the week's program of events.

## PLAYGROUNDS CHEAT DEATH

NEW YORK (AP)—Fatal street accidents to children are much fewer in cities amply supplied with well distributed playgrounds than in cities not so well supplied with these safety zones. The conclusion of the National Safety Council engineers was made public recently by the Playground and Recreation Association of America, with which the council is operating in its safety campaign.

The investigations of the safety experts in most of the cities cover the three year period 1922-24 and show that cities with the most playgrounds had only one-third to one-fourth as many child pedestrian fatalities as adult fatalities.

In Cleveland, with a high pedestrian fatality rate, less than 20 per cent of the victims were children, according to the study. The city has 72 supervised playgrounds. Its low percentage of child fatalities is in marked contrast to the high percentage in a western county, where playgrounds are few and poorly distributed.

In Toledo, very few child fatalities were found within normal driving distances to playground locations. Toledo has 12 playgrounds. The positions of the grounds were plotted on a spot map and circles of a quarter mile and half mile radii were drawn about each to indicate their effective area for the different ages of children. Out of 22 child automobile fatalities during the three years, 1922-1924 inclusive, only four occurred within the quarter mile circles and six in the half mile distance.

In Richmond, which has many playgrounds in proportion to the population, the child automobile fatalities were less than 25 per cent of the total number in which pedestrians were involved. Only 12 children were killed by automobiles in the city during a three-year period ended December 31, 1924.

Two hundred thirty-one cities established 625 new playgrounds last year, the Playground and Recreation Association reports. New athletic fields number 122.

**Cottage Grove Contracts Let.**  
COTTAGE GROVE, Ore.—A contract for construction of a million-gallon water storage reservoir has been let by the city council to Goddard & Randall, a local firm, at a price of \$137,000. J. C. Compton company, McMinnville, bid \$129,543.10 and Searthy Brothers bid \$135,244.93. The reservoir will be completed within 180 days. Contracts were also let for the paving of East Monroe avenue and one block of Jefferson avenue with black top. J. C. Compton company, with the contract for other street work under way, was the only bidder.

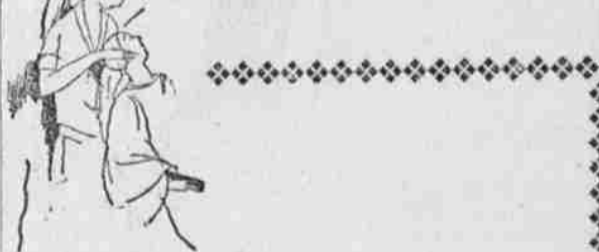

## MANY LOCATE IN THE STATE

Reports received here state that the past week has been a busy one for new settlers in the land settlement department of the Portland chamber of commerce.

Marion county has reported 185 out of the state arrivals since January, and Lane county has admitted a like list of 25 since June first. Klamath county has just sent in the names of six farmers of Bishop, California, who have bought farms in that section of southern Oregon during the past month. Nine other new settlers have been reported into the department during the past week, making a total of 236.

This reaches the record of almost 1900 settlers reported through the department during its period of operation, the actual figures to date being 932.
