Leave for Seattle—

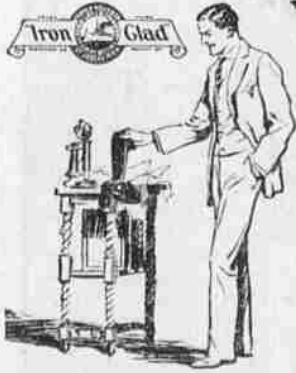

ROADS APPEAL ON RATES. SALEM, Ore.—Ten railroad companies operating in Oregon appealed to the supreme court this morning for a decision on their decision of the Marion county circuit court putting into operation an order of the public service commission reducing freight rates on farm products from 15 to 25 per cent.

The order of the public service commission was issued more than a year ago, but the railroads objected by the reductions obtained an injunction preventing the commission from putting the new tariff in operation.

The Marion county circuit court handed down a decision last week dissolving the injunction.
