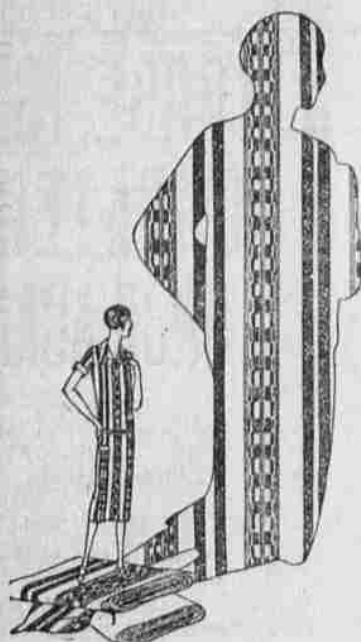

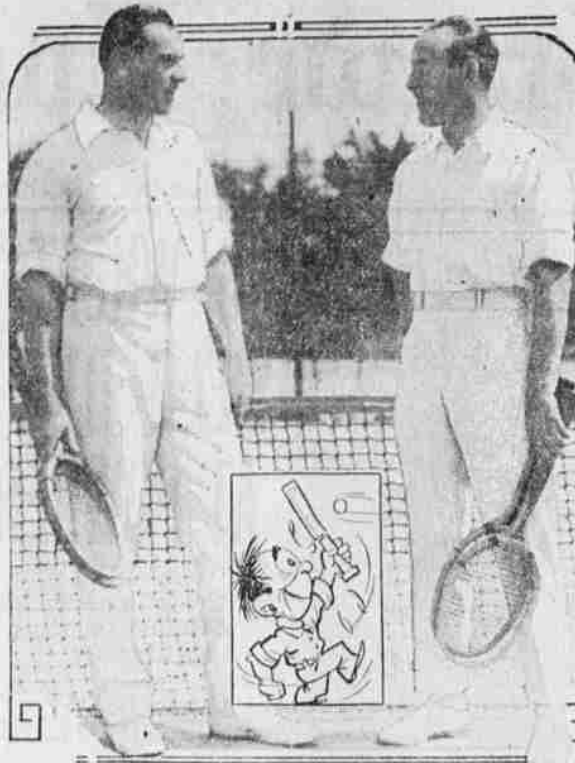
That— While the effect is very pleasing after such a long reign of the period silhouette, let us hope that it does not bring with it the heavily boned corset as it did a thousand years ago.

Harry Greb Ready to Fight Jack Dempsey

CHICAGO (AP)—Harry Greb, world's middleweight champion, may be matched with Jack Dempsey in a 10-round no decision contest in the open air arena at Michigan City, Ind., on the afternoon of September 19 or 25.

Greb, at a meeting of Chicago sports writers with Promoter Floyd Fitzsimmons Thursday night, was chosen as the best available opponent for Dempsey in view of the fact that the heavyweight champion said he could not be ready for any engagement with Gene Tunney or Harry Wills this year.

Promoter Fitzsimmons said he had received assurance from Dempsey by telephone from Salt Lake that the champion would box Greb and he would post a forfeit as soon as the match was closed.

Greb has assured Fitzsimmons he will accept the match.

Promoter Fitzsimmons said he would post a \$50,000 guarantee to stage the contest as soon as Dempsey signed the articles.

Before leaving for the coast Dempsey said he would return to Chicago within two weeks to start training for the bout if arranged. Greb always has believed he could out box the champion and out speed him in a short contest. He boxed Dempsey two or three times in training camps with a result that Dempsey was unable to do very much with him.

SISLER'S COMEBACK. With the season half over, Manager George Sisler of the St. Louis Browns has proved beyond a doubt that he has entirely recovered from the eye affliction that for a time threatened to end his career.

Last year Sisler was weak on low balls. No doubt he had trouble properly focusing on such a pitch. American League pitchers decided that was his weakness.

Since the opening of the present season they have changed their minds. Always a good low ball hitter, Sisler is himself again on that style pitch. Died-damnally, he is hitting the ball to all fields, absolute proof of his comeback.

The other day in a game against Washington, Sisler enjoyed the unique distinction of hitting a triple with the bases filled and in the following inning a home run with the bases loaded.

I doubt if ever before in the majors has a batsman accomplished such a feat in successive innings.

WISE MICKEY WALKER. I see where Mickey Walker says that Dave Shade will have to fight him in California for the welterweight title or nowhere.

In all probability Dave Shade's knockout of the much-touted Jimmy Sixtary has made Walker a winner young man. No doubt he learned another lesson about his own ability in his bout with Greb.

It seems that aside from selecting the battleground for a bout with Shade, Walker also seeks a hand plucked referee.

BREAK FOR QUINN.

Recently the Boston Red Sox asked for waivers on the veteran spitball pitcher, Jack Quinn.

The two leading clubs, Washington and Philadelphia, refused to waive. Since the club with the lowest standing has the right to the player, he goes to Philadelphia, as Washington was in the lead when waivers were asked.

He goes from a near tailender to a near champ with pennant chances.

At the time waivers were requested on Quinn he had won more games than any other Boston pitcher, seven.

PHIL ROSENBERG STOPS SHEA IN FOURTH ROUND

NEW YORK (AP)—Charley (Phil) Rosenberg of New York, world's bantamweight champion, knocked out Eddie Shea of Chicago in the fourth round of a 15-round title match at the Volodrome Athletic club Thursday night.

The champion floored his challenger twice in the third round with stiff right hand blows to the jaw. Right after the start of the fourth round Shea caught another on the jaw and took nine before he came up. Then Rosenberg stepped back, measured Shea for the finishing punch and crashed through with a right to the jaw which knocked Shea out. The end came 37 seconds after the start of the fourth round.
