## BRYAN HONORS MILTON MILLER

PORTLAND. — Milton A. Miller has been chosen by William J. Bryan as one of a committee of 29 personal friends who are invited to select the party which he and Mrs. Bryan intend to direct on a tour of the Holy Land next spring. In a personal letter received by Mr. Miller yesterday Mr. Bryan stated that his aim was to revive the enthusiasm for genuine Christian pilgrimage to ancient religious shrines.

Mr. Miller said that he had taken the matter under consideration and might decide to make the trip. He was convinced that a number of Oregon people could be persuaded to accompany Mr. Bryan on his pilgrimage.

The tour, which will be of two months' duration, is described by Mr. Bryan as a cruise with the avowed purpose of "deepening religious experience" rather than pleasure. Mr. Miller will deliver a series of addresses that embody his beliefs and enthusiasms and by the party. Among them will be an address on Mass. Hill, Athens, an appreciation of the career of Moses while crossing the land of Goshen, his famous oration on the "Truce of Peace" over the manager at Bethlehem, an interpretation of the passion in the Garden of Gethsemane and a service beside the garden tomb at dawn on Easter morning. During the voyage Bryan will conduct his usual Bible classes.

"It is a fitting climax to the career of Mr. Bryan," declares the descriptive folder, "that after his years of strenuous devotion to his country and to the great moral causes he should now lead the hosts of Christian people personally to the Holy Land and share with them his wide experience of life, the ripened maturity of his thoughts and the inspiration of his religious conviction."

The folder further declares that "it is not necessary that the pilgrims should think as Mr. Bryan does on either politics or religion" but urges that it is highly desirable that they be "sympathetic to religious view of life."

The tour is endorsed by Thomas G. McLeod, governor of South Carolina; Charles H. Brough, ex-governor of Arkansas; Eugene Fox, ex-governor of Massachusetts; Dr. Daniel A. Poling of New York; Walter Williams, dean of the University of Missouri school of Journalism; and 18 prominent ministers in various cities in the United States.

## Use of Social Glass Reported Increasing In Near and Far East

EDINBURGH (AP)—The young East is rapidly adopting the social ways of the West, delegates from the Orient told the recent World convention of the Women's Christian Temperance Union.

Speakers from temperance organizations of Egypt, Burma, India, China and Japan told the same story of younger generations of people with age-old traditions of abstinence and asceticism handed down through religion and philosophy, making free use of the cocktail, champagne cup and stronger drinks at social functions.

Floren Hanna, a youthful delegate from Cairo, described the Egyptian people as a race of "traditional prohibitionists," asserting that they have no national beverage. Young men of Egypt, however, are taking to western drinks along with western ways, she said. She detailed temperance work since its inauguration in Cairo in 1922. Last year 7,000 Egyptian women presented a petition to the British government asking for prohibition.

The Burmese people, according to Miss Mae Ruth, delegate from Burma, should be prohibitionists by the teaching of Buddhism. Foreign drinks are increasingly used in crime in Burma to increase consumption of alcoholic beverages, other than toddy, the native drink.

Miss Aho Matsushita of Tokyo, a student at the University of Pennsylvania, testified to increasing use of western drinks among young Japanese. There is a counter-temperance movement growing up in Japan, however, she told the convention.

"I am a student, an unfinished product," she said in broken English. "But I am the fact which proves that Young Japan is taking an active interest and is moving up in the work."

The situation in China was explained by Christiana Tching, paid organizer at the World W. C. T. U., who recently returned from temperance work there. She asserted that there was a growing sentiment among educated young Chinese that they must be able to drink western beverages to prove their education.
