"The Talker" Here With Great Cast; Anna Q. Featured.

An imposing array of favorites from the east of "The Talker," First National's latest offering which is now at the Arcade.

In the featured roles we found Anna Q. Nilsson, as beautiful and as gorgeously costumed as ever, and the polished and immaculate Lewis S. Stone. These two were last seen here together in "Eyes From Hollywood."

And in lesser roles are seen Shirley Mason, Ina Keith, Tully Marshall and others almost equally as well known.

"The Talker," from its cast alone, can be guaranteed a good screen entertainment.

The story is from Marion Fairfax's story, full of the same title, and while it unfolds a rapid succession of tense love scenes and thrills, finds its basis in the prosaic figure of a woman who hates household and likes to talk.

She is one of those ultra-modern women who believes in the freedom of her sex, and she defies her husband to curb her. Miss Nilsson as the talking wife, and Stone in the role of the silent, or rather silent-but-not, find ideal scope for some excellent portrayals.

"The Talker" was produced by Sam E. Roth, and directed by Alfred E. Green. Green's direction of "Colleen Moore in 'Sally'" and other good screen plays has brought him up to the pinnacle of his profession.

Furthermore, the story deals with the west of today, for Zane Grey these are radical departures.

The plot primarily concerns itself with the romance of a cowboy and a flapper. The girl, who goes out west for her health, typifies the jazz life of the east. She deliberately plans to attract the sturdy young westerner, but laughingly turns him down when he proposes. But in the next such episode is not easily conduced as she turns to her dismay; The cowboy forces her to marry him and then—but what happens after that you will have to find out for yourselves from the picture.

Owen Moore, popular film player, has the leading male role. Constance Bennett, because of her acting ability, youth and screen charm was selected to play the part of the flapper. Others in the cast who are featured include, Malini Ballin, Charles Ogle and David Butler.

William K. Howard, who produced the picture, has done a workmanlike job. He deserves an especial pat on the back for his effective handling of the big scenes in the production—notably, an exciting automobile-horse race and a tremendous forest fire.

It is his shrewd direction, coupled with Lucien Hubbard's skillful adaptation and the fact that the story was photographed in the exact locale described by the author—Tonto Basin, Arizona, one of the most primitive wildernesses in the United States—that gives "Code

of the West" the distinction of being something new in western films.

Great Britain Selects Scholars for U. S. Term

CAMBRIDGE, (AP)—The committee of the Henry P. Davidson Scholarship Fund has selected the following scholars for the academic year 1925-26: J. H. Thomas of Sidney Sussex to Yale; W. P. N. Edwards of Corpus Christi to Princeton; and G. C. H. Key of Trinity to Harvard. Thomas was the Chancellor's medal for English verse this year; Key recently gained a first in the law tripos and Edwards has played golf for the University.

The Henry P. Davidson scholarship fund was founded in 1923 by Mrs. Davidson, widow of the former chairman of the Red Cross and partner in J. P. Morgan & Co. in memory of her husband and to carry out an ideal of his own. The fund provides that six English students representing "the highest type of university man" shall spend at least a year in Harvard, Yale or Princeton. The object of the fund is "to aid in fostering goodwill between the United States and Great Britain."
