U. S. Dominates Theaters Of Europe, Says Critic

BERLIN. (AP)—America is setting its imprimatur upon the French theatre quite as much as upon that of Germany of old Austria, in the opinion of Hellmuth Bernick, critic, writing in the *Lucht Anzeiger*.

"America is the bacillus," he observes, "which is infecting Europe. One notices this in Paris quite as much as in Berlin or Vienna. What Berlin would have thought of producing 'Aida' in the open air outside of Vienna for an audience numbering tens of thousands, were it not for the fact that New York transformed a church into a theatre, and made a theatre into a church? America with its super-European dimensions simply kills the theatre bulls that have been kept up since the days of baroque. At Hollywood America builds up the whole inner city of Paris in order to film the photoplay 'Notre Dame.' America cracks the whip in the Casino de Paris and in the Olympia, and all Paris applauds.

WEST YELLOWSTONE, Mont., (AP)—Jesse James, the celebrated holdup man of the Yellowstone National National Park, has a number of understudies this year and automobilists are making many unwillful contributions of cigarettes and other food-stuffs before they are able to escape the snail's snail.

Old Jesse James, a large black bear discovered several years ago that by planting himself in the middle of park roads he could halt autos and force passengers to feed him. Being thoroughly protected in a national park he was in no danger and roamed the delicate canyons and larches carried by tourists far more appetizing than the refuse in the garbage cans at the hotels.

The first imitator of the original holdup bear was a little black bear which has been nicknamed Little Jesse James, but now there are half a dozen hold-up bears and all the members of the James and Younger gang, thieves when take much delight in terrifying tourists and separating them from everything in their larders.

Wags take delight in subjecting motorists to the attacks of the impudent animal outlaws, which have no hesitation about climbing into cars with passengers and making a search of their pockets for candy.
