Not to be outdone, Garity connected for a clean triple into the same territory in the seventh with one score and the bases populated. Garity scored a minute later when Burdie hit one at short. Heim's leg to the plate was wide and Garity with a neat hook slide, registered.

La Grande's play was rather rough. Parris of Walla Walla was touched for eight hits in seven innings and Garity, who relieved him in the eighth, yielded one blow. But both helped the Pirate pitchers, some of them by shaking themselves behind the canvas of the Magicians' material. Six errors are charged to the Pirates, Heim at short, registering twice in the nine-out inning and both expensive bobbles.

Export trade was comparatively quiet due to impending miners' strike in England and heavy importation of Danish meats.

The convention was held at the Pacific Northwest Real Estate association at its convention here. The resolution set out that there is "neither justice or equity" in the assessment of "nearly the entire burden of state and local taxes" upon real estate.

The convention adopted the taxation committee's report being unfavorable to taxation, a more equitable distribution of taxes, a ten per cent assessment for taxation purposes, and an increase in the state gasoline tax from two to three cents.

In Kirkland's machine were also Mrs. Kirkland and their two small children, but none of them was injured.

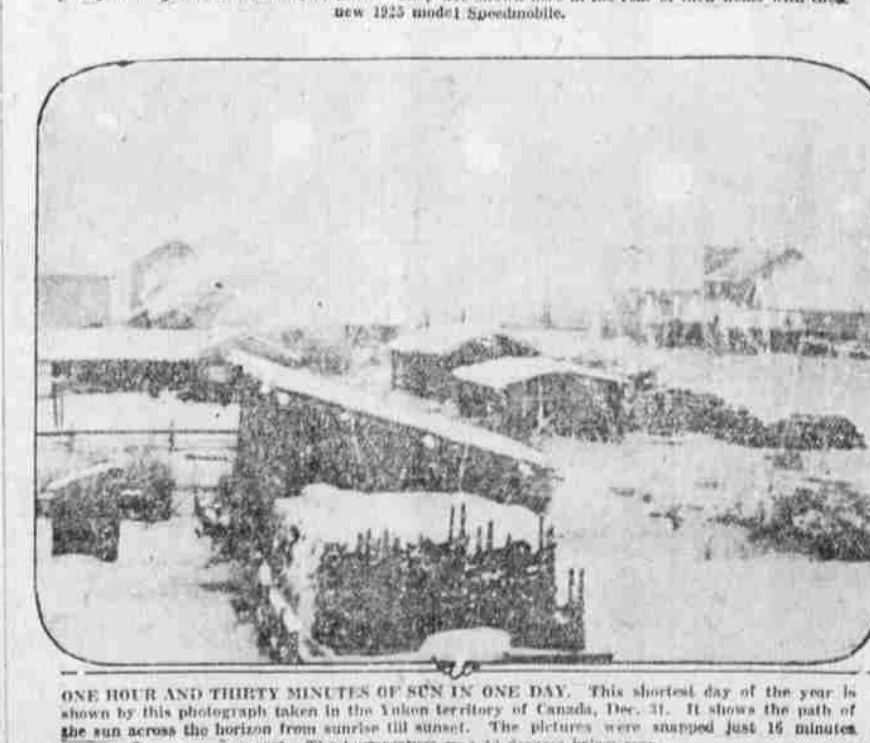
Holcomb's car is said to be a total wreck, and one side of the Kirkland automobile is smashed.
