SAN FRANCISCO, Cal. (By the Associated Press)—Increasing his lead five points during the week at the expense of Sacramento hurlers, "Lefty" O'Doul, hard hitting Salt Lake outfielder, is resting comfortably at the top of Pacific Coast league hitters. Unofficial figures, including Saturday's game, give the New batsman an average of .425 per cent.

Frank Brazil of Seattle held his own during the week's play and still holds second honors with .411. Paul Wamer, Seal outfielder, gained five points, and now has an average of .406.

TORONTO (AP)—Three American golf professionals, holding the open championship of three nations would be matched for the world's championship if a challenge issued by Leo Diegel is accepted and such a title as a world's championship is recognized.

While McParlane, United States open champion, stands ready to play Diegel, who last week won the Canadian open. It is reported that they have agreed to play the first elimination match after the winter open at Youngstown, August 18 to 20. Jim Barnes, holder of the British title, has not yet expressed himself. Diegel feels that the challenge should come officially from the Royal Canadian Golf association and that one of the matches should be played on a Canadian course.

MOVIE MEN BUILT CITY

Batters Must Sign Articles, Commish Says

NEW YORK (AP)—Jack Dempsey and Mickey Walker will be indefinitely suspended by the New York athletic commission today if they do not appear in person before the commission and sign articles with their outstanding challengers, Harry Wells and Dave Shade. This was learned from a reliable source close to the boxing commission Monday night.

Dempsey's presence on the Pacific coast prohibits his appearance, while Walker, it was learned Monday night, will not accept the commission's invitation to a conference until the arrival of his manager, Jack Keenan, who is now on his way and is due to arrive here the latter part of the week, or the first of next week.

Both Dempsey and Walker will come under an ineligible ban which is virtually the same as a suspension, inasmuch as it prevents them from fighting in New York state or sister states where a working agreement exists, from dictating with promoters for future matches or from attending boxing exhibitions held under the jurisdiction of the state bodies. Owing to the fact that they do not hold licenses with the New York commission they cannot be suspended technically, but the ban which will be placed against them will operate the same as a suspension.

Union Plans East Oregon Net Tourney

The Union, Ore. Athletic association announces today that an Eastern Oregon tennis championship tournament will be played at Union August 15-16. This will be the first real district net tourney and the association hopes to make the event an annual fixture.

The association will issue invitations to players in La Grande, Baker, Pendleton, Milton-Freswater, Enterprise, Imbler, North Powder, Prairie City, Union and other cities and towns east of the Cascades. An entry fee of one dollar will be charged and all entries must be in the hands of Fred N. Fox, Union, by August 12 in order to make the player eligible for championship competition.

In the women's tournament both singles and doubles will be played and the women will participate in singles and also doubles if enough enter.

Oregon Cowboys Take Part in Chicago Rodeo

To capture the Oregon championship honors in the greatest of all western sports, more than a score of cowboys and cowgirls from this state will descend on Chicago August 15, to 23 for the Roundup and World's Championship Rodeo. The rodeo, which will be held in the Grand Park stadium, is under the auspices of the Chicago Association of Commerce, with "Tex" Austin, foremost of cowboy central directors, in charge of the various events.

Mike Hastings of Pendleton, world's champion steer wrestler in 1921, and holder of the world's record for throwing a steer in seven seconds that is among those from Oregon who have signified their intention of taking part in the Chicago rodeo. Others from Oregon who have taken notable part in previous world championship rodeo contests, and who are expected to attend the Chicago contest are: Fox Hastings, Loretta Butler and Opal Wood, all of Pendleton, and Everett Higgs of Lake View.

The Oregon group, anticipating no "soft business" at the Chicago rodeo, however, for they are to meet a hundred or more cowboys and cowgirls from other western and south-western states bent on the same mission as the mid-west. From the "brush of the Southwest to the ranges of Canada the challenge has gone out to the buckaroos, and these together with the cowgirls and steer bulldoggers will there renew old rivalries and perhaps write new records into the annals of the cattle country. Winners in the Chicago will share in \$20,000 in cash prizes, the largest sum offered anywhere this year, as well as in the world championship belts and trophies.

Employment Demand High, 4L Report Says

PORTLAND, (Overland)—That there are not for all available men in the Pacific Northwest is indicated by telegraphic reports from 4L employment service offices in various north-western cities received at 4L headquarters here today. Unemployment, however, is not general, and activity in the fruit canning industry has more work than taken up the week brought about by curtailed operation in the fir logging districts, the reports show.

Some shortage of skilled pine sawmill help is reported from the Inland Empire, where wood operations and lumber manufacturing plants are at capacity. Pined flow largely unobstructed last week, but several hundred men are still required to watch fire lines in logging limits in various timber reserves.

Almost without exception employment centers report that jobs offered are difficult to fill with suitably experienced men, despite the fact that there appear to be many men on the "backroads."
