### Gasoline Tax in Washington

**Builds Good Roads for State**  
TACOMA, Wash. (AP)—The highways of Washington have received \$9,175,000 from the state gasoline tax since August 21, 1921. The tax now is two cents a gallon, having been raised from the original one cent levy. At present the yield from the tax is close to \$250,000 monthly, a sum sufficient to pave ten miles of highway that already has been graded.

All money from the gasoline tax is used to build roads. This fund and the license fees from automobile drivers have been largely responsible for the improved highway system in the state.

## Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast—Apple sauce, crisp broiled bacon, scrambled eggs, brown muffins, milk, coffee.

Lunch—Peas pudding, endive salad, whole wheat bread, baked peaches, plain cookies, milk, tea.

Dinner—Roast beef, potatoes baked with meat, corn on the cob, stuffed tomato salad, raspberry mousses, mock angel food, rye bread, milk, coffee.

Children under six years of age should not eat corn on the cob. They may be served green corn if it is shaved and well cooked, but sweet corn, delicious as it is, is not easy to digest and should not be served to children or old persons.

### Peas Pudding

Two cups green peas, 2 eggs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 1/2 cups milk, 2 tablespoons flour.

Melt butter, add flour and stir until smooth. Add milk, stirring constantly. Season with salt and pepper and cook until smooth. Add eggs beaten and heat mixture until mixture is perfectly smooth. Add peas and turn into a well-buttered baking-dish. Put into a pan of hot water and bake in a hot oven for 20 minutes. Serve at once.

## WOMAN DIES IN TROPIC STORM

HONOLULU (AP)—One woman was killed and three men threatened with death Sunday and Monday night when unusually high winds swept the Hawaiian islands and churned surrounding waters into foam.

Mrs. Yasu Suy-tan died of injuries received when her small automobile was blown off the hillside.

David Kulanamoku, brother of Duke Kahanamoku, the internationally known swimmer, was adrift at sea with two companions in a disabled launch 13 hours before a seaplane spotted the little craft and sent a motor tug to rescue them.

John P. Edgar, Honolulu realtor, was caught by the undertow at Makapuu Point. Life guards went to his rescue, but Edgar regained the shore after a battle of half an hour with the waves.

### Surf Invades Homes.

The heaviest surf in years did thousands of dollars' damage along the Honolulu beach residential district, wrecking lawns and invading beach homes. It was still raining hard today. Some of the larger ground at Fort Kamehameha was submerged, the water reaching the road leading to the headquarters building.

Some damage from the high winds also was reported from the island of Hawaii.

## Fourteen Points Guide To Successful Movies

HOLLYWOOD, Cal. (AP)—Through a recently established system of selecting plots that conform to the viewpoint of 14 dramatic points, motion picture producers here now practically assure of a photoplay before it is made. Of thousands of films produced in the past many were failures from the standpoint of audiences.

Irving Cummings, director, under whose direction several productions have been filmed through this new method, declares that in the future failures will be almost completely eliminated. In the former days pictures that appeal to the audience will be turned out, he said.

The photoplay when adjudged by this method should contain a majority of the fourteen following dramatic ingredients: ambition, conflict, conspiracy, devotion, eternal triangle, greed, intrigue, love, mother, the quadrangle, reprobation, reconciliation, sacrifice, feminine appeal.
