**SUGAR MAN IN SALEM**— SALEM, Ore.—J. W. Timpon, Washington manager for the Utah-Idaho Sugar company, arrived here to inspect the various holdings in the Willamette valley to determine their adaptability for the growing of sugar beets. Mr. Timpon said that tests made here previously indicated that much of the land in the Willamette valley would produce sugar beets on a commercial scale. He would make no prediction as to whether the concern he represents would establish a sugar factory in this vicinity. The company has 14 sugar plants in other districts, the latest one of which was erected at Billingham, Wash., at a cost of \$1,000,000.

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## FIELD TRIALS FOR DOGS SET

A special committee of sportsmen with the sanction of the Wing, Fin and Picketfoot club are planning on a day of field trials to be held here on October 10th. The trials are to be made an annual affair, according to present plans and are to be held for the purpose of improving pointer and setter dogs by testing their field qualities under expert observation. These field trials will have a great effect in encouraging owners to raise good strains of dogs and, says the statement issued by the committee "increase the interest in legitimate sport with dog and gun; encourage respect for an enforcement of all laws enacted for the protection of game, and promote good fellowship and social intercourse among the sportsmen." The field trials here will come on a date just between the field days at Spokane and at Boise and the committee hopes to get entries from sportsmen who will ship their dogs through from Washington to Idaho. Three open stakes will be held. 1st—All age free for all. 2nd—Bobby, free for all. 3rd—Pop, free for all. In addition to these there will be one shooting dog stake with all professional handlers and dogs that have ever contested barred. A professional is defined as one who accepts or has ever accepted money for training or handling dogs. In this contest more attention will be paid by the judges to obedience and bird sense than to range. The trials will all be run under
