WOMAN FAILS IN LONG SWIM

DOVER, Eng. (AP)—Miss Sion, the French girl swimmer, failed Tuesday night in her effort to swim the English channel. She was within a mile and a quarter of Dover when she gave up.

Although she failed in her effort, Miss Sion set a record for women swimmers of the channel, as the nearest any here before have come has been five miles from the coast.

Weather and water conditions were favorable when she took her plunge at Cape Gris-Nez at 8:10 Tuesday morning and the sea was unusually calm.

By mid-afternoon she had reached a point approximately half way and by early evening was within five miles of the pier at Dover. The sea still remained calm but adverse tides were holding back the swimmer.

At 10:45 o'clock Tuesday night in final strong effort brought her to within a mile and a quarter of Dover but the rushing tide and the coldness of the water forced her to give up.

She was pulled aboard the accompanying tug which did not come into the pier here but put about and started back to France.

TITLE TENTH FOR H. C. EGAN

SEATTLE (AP)—During the hottest of a golf match at Medford, Ore., the rancher, H. Chandler Egan, went out and won his tenth amateur golf title in 22 years.

To take this year's Pacific Northwest amateur championship Egan played through a week at the Tacoma Golf and Country club wearing a hat to keep a cool head.

He defeated four young men, the most of them Forest Watson, Spokane, inland Empire champion.

Of the match play with Watson in the final one writer said: "It was the old master getting the jump on a nervous youth at the outset and never letting him get up again."

Egan won 2 and 2. In 1902 Egan won the Western amateur title at Chicago. His brother Walter was champion the next year. Walter was champion and Chandler the victim in the final.

In 1904 and 1905 Chandler captured four crowns, the western title and the national twice. In 1907 he was Western champion.

In 1914 Chandler Egan moved to the Pacific coast. He tried at once for the Pacific Northwest title and was runner-up to Jack Neville. He was champion the next year at Tacoma. Five years later at Vancouver, B. C. and in 1922 at Seattle.

The expert observers at Tacoma this summer noted that Egan had lost a swing once "halted as the perfection of rhythmic grace" and "there was noticeable just before the instant of impact a sort of jerk" but "his work with his iron was a real revelation" and "he showed a supernatural ability to punch the ball to the pin from fairway, rough or hazard, especially when the occasion demanded a heroic effort."
