## Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast—Stewed prunes, cereal, thin cream, French toast, syrup, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Cream of potato soup, tomato and cabbage salad, oatmeal macaroni, berries, whole wheat bread, milk, tea.

Dinner—Jellied bouillon rice, leaf, creamed string beans, watercress and cheese ball salad, sliced peaches, sponge cake, granular bread, milk, coffee.

The tea and coffee may be fed or but during the summer months are preferred. If fed the beverages should be made stronger than usual and served hot and freshly made over reached ice. Sweetened whipped cream is often served with lead coffee but never with lead tea. Lemon or some other tart fruit juice with sugar is served with lead tea.

**Watercress and Cheese Ball Salad**  
One and one-half cups dry cottage cheese, 1-2 cup finely chopped milk, 1/2 cup of tomato catsup, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 1 bunch watercress, French dressing.

Combine cheese, nuts, salt, paprika and catsup. Chill and shape into small balls. Serve three or four balls to each person. Wash balls in a hot of cream and serve with French dressing.
