German War Policy Defended In Volume by Ex-Crown Prince

BERLIN, (AP) - The former crown prince has written a book, "I Seek the Truth," which he takes his place among those seeking to refute the accusation of war guilt against Germany. "Who knows evil at Bismarck, at Kaiser Wilhelm II," he asks "for having conducted an expansive policy, when all those powers allied against us had been pursuing the identical policy for many years? At all times those rulers and statesmen enjoyed the greatest prestige who had succeeded in increasing their nation's prosperity. For centuries the paramount object of those nations who became Germany's violent accusers had been their own aggrandizement. By what right then in Germany stigmatized as a would-be devourer of the rest of the world? The writer points out that England managed to conquer one fifth of the globe and says that France grabbed numerous overseas possessions in many instances with the most ruthless means. Even the mighty Russian empire, which he says was capable of supporting double its present population, is described as striving to extend its vast east-Asian dominion to the shores of the Pacific. "But Germany," the writer asserts "was begrimed the few colonies she had acquired, almost without shedding a single drop of blood." The writer then goes to some pains to dispel the widespread belief that the old-time monarchial set was responsible for the imperial policy of expansion. It is stated emphatically that the conservatives before all others were the ones to offer unrelenting opposition to the acquisition of colonies. England is told that living in a glass house, is not justified in throwing stones at others for an infringement of Belgian neutrality. A detailed description is given of the British navy in 1907 and the footing of the Danish fleet, all without a declaration of war.
