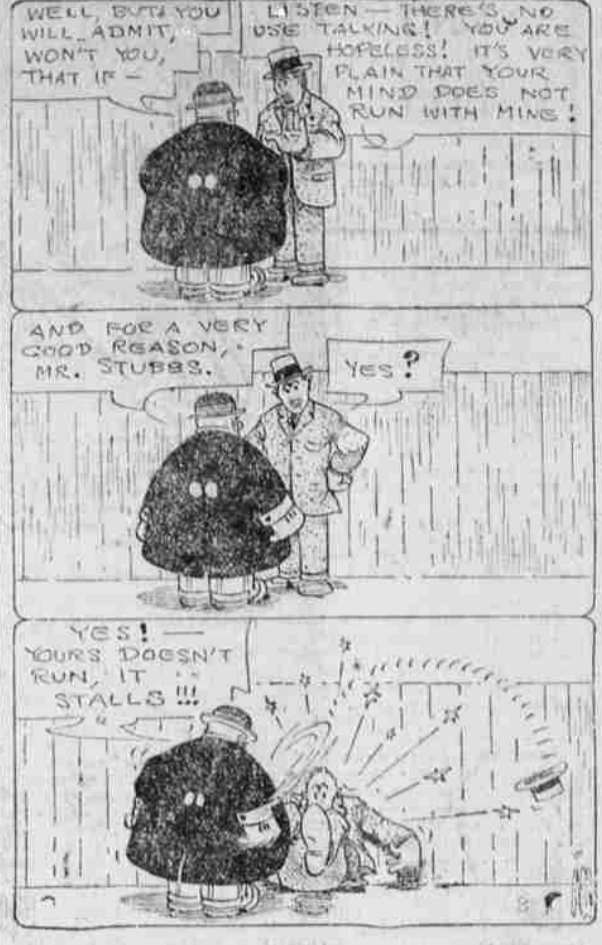
## TELEPHONE CALL RECORD MOUNTS WITH MERCURY

Telephone traffic increases to a phenomenal extent during a heat wave. At such times there is a great need for a sharp variation in the telephoning habits of the public which generally serves to guide telephone engineers in the handling of traffic during the various periods of the day.

During a recent period called to New York, telephone calls averaged about 200,000 a day above normal. Even more striking was the increase in the suburbs. In Westchester County, which has a large commuting population, calls jumped to 125 per cent above normal. Coney Island showed a gain of 100 per cent on the hottest days. In the state, outside of New York City, the gain was about 50,000 calls a day, while in northern New Jersey there was a jump from 80,000 average calls per day to 225,000. It was even found necessary to send operators to the outlying districts to handle the increased traffic.

Usually telephone traffic is at its peak in the morning between the hours of 9 and 10, in the afternoon between 3 and 4 and in the early evening. Throughout the heat wave, though, people started their telephoning an hour or two earlier than usual and continued it much later at night. When finally the heat wave broke, there was an extraordinary rush of calls.

## TRADE WAR IS BEING FOUGHT

DANZIG, (AP)—The trade war between Poland and Germany now in progress may have one beneficial result in the opinion of many Danzig business men. If it will mean the defection of Upper Silesian coal to the countries bordering upon the Baltic sea which were formerly a part of the Russian Empire. Such a defection would, in their opinion, prove an advantage to four interested groups: The Poles would have a promising new market in exchange for the German; Danzig would gain much new business as the shipping port; the Baltic countries could obtain the coal more cheaply than they can now buy English coal; Germany could dispose of her Ruhr coal without the interference of Upper Silesian coal competition.

To effect such a fundamental transformation, Danzig must improve its loading and unloading facilities. At present it can care of 25,000 tons of coal a month, but it is said that the machinery for transshipment from railroad to ocean going vessels is not as up-to-date and time-saving as it should be. There is, therefore, a campaign under way among the business men for remedying this situation and equipping Danzig properly.

The people of Danzig are the innocent victims of another phase of the war between Germany and Poland. Goods of purely Danzig origin may go to Germany unimpeded and to return food, raw materials and other articles intended purely for Danzig are permitted to come into the Free City, exempt.

As a matter of fact there are practically no goods of purely Danzig origin, consequently exporting that class of merchandise affords little comfort to the Danzig business man. While foodstuffs may come from Germany into Danzig unaffected by the tariff war, the people of Danzig get little benefit. There are no customs barriers between Danzig and Poland, the two have long been inseparably linked by the treaty of Commerce in a customs union. Thus Danzig dealers find it more profitable to pass their German foodstuffs on to Poland where they can obtain better prices for them.

### Unemployment Drops in Italy.

ROME (AP)—Unemployment in Italy is decreasing rapidly, statistics of the National Association for Social Insurance show. It reports that on May 1 the total of unemployed in Italy was 161,495, representing a decrease of 25,114 from April 1.

The unemployed on May 1 included 34,673 women.

Heavy Traffic Jams in Berlin Indicate Recovery from War BERLIN (AP)—Heavy vehicular traffic in Berlin betrays the idea that the city is still in a more or less paralytic state from the effects of the war, according to a traffic census taken recently by the National Zeitung at Potsdamer Platz. Crossing the square, the center of traffic in Berlin, approximately 1481 automobiles, 1281 bicycles, 306 street cars, 162 buses and 179 sundry vehicles were counted in one hour. 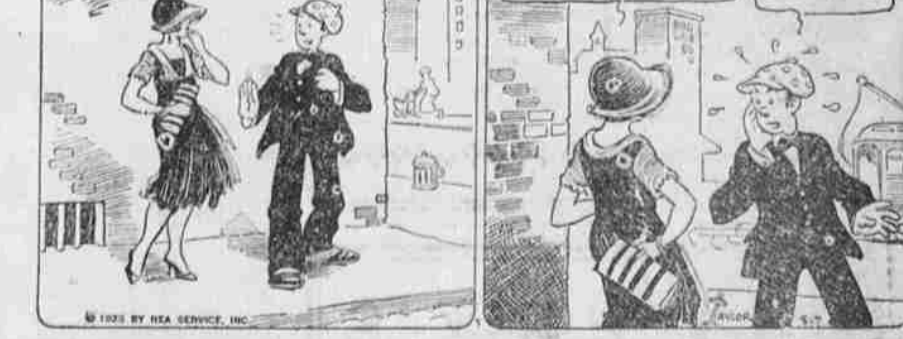
