DIMICK CASE HEARING
 SALEM, Ore.—A citation was issued in the county court here ordering that Harry Dimick, Oregon City, appear to appear on August 7 and show cause why he should not be removed as administrator of the estate of his brother, Ralph C. Dimick.

The petition for the citation was filed by Harry E. Dimick, who represented that he had been appointed administrator of his brother's estate. Ralph Dimick, at the time of his death, left real property in Marion county valued at \$41,000. The personal property was appraised at \$642.

At the time Grand Juror Dimick also attended from Oregon City it was alleged that he was involved financially to the extent of \$200,000.

Democratic member of the Oregon State Bar, Harry E. Dimick, said the council saved the princess from being exiled to Schenck Island. It was at that time she became acquainted with Harry Dimick, who proved himself a friend and adviser in regard to the upbringing and education of her children. Both of the princess' children have been divorced.

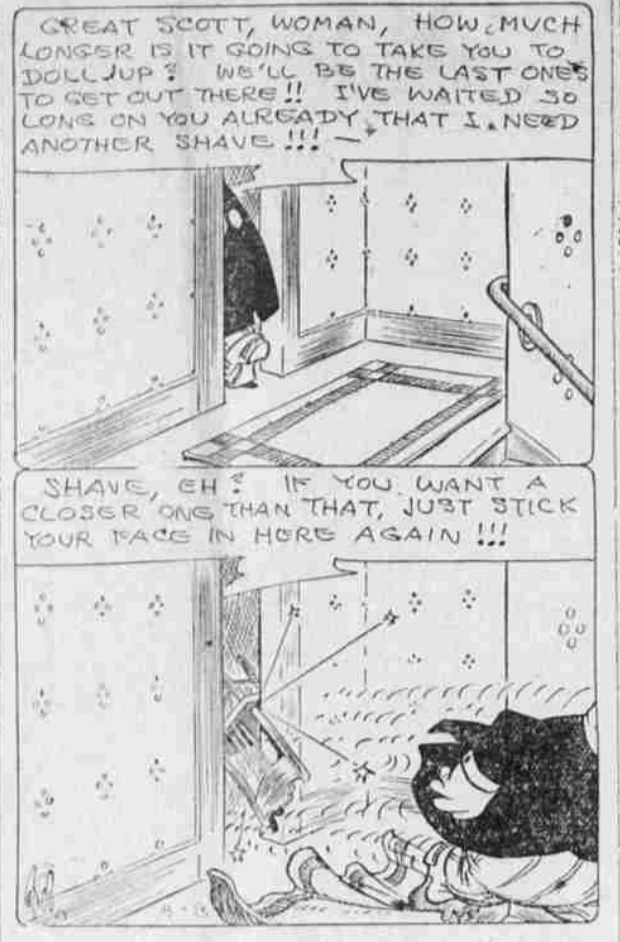

GOLD COMING FROM CASSIAR
 WILMING, Alaska (AP)—After repeated reports of failures, gold is being taken in paying quantities in the Telegraph Creek district of the Cassiar country, British Columbia, where a strike was made last autumn.

First shipments of gold from the district which lies 200 miles east of here, were in Wrangell Thursday, brought out by a boat on the Sitkine river.

On Gold Pan creek, where William Grady made the strike, he and his partner, named Ford, obtained 117 ounces of gold in 15 days. Next above Grady and Ford on the creek, a claim owned by Judge William G. Thomas of this city, and worked by three employees, is producing about equally as well.

On the claim of R. D. Brunson, the second below the Grady-Ford tract, 230 of gold per day per man was being removed when the last news started from the district. The 15th, 16th and 17th claims below the discovery, which are owned by Albert Deane and partners, were yielding \$25 daily per man.

News that gold was really coming out of the country, following authoritative reports from travelers and other investigators that a stampede into the Sashish in the spring had been a hoax, set persons who had abandoned claims to retaking them.

The gold brought here was obtained when miners began washing or cleaning earth that they and Ford garnered 15 ounces in the first three days of their clean-up, with three men shoveling. Another clean-up four days later produced 17 ounces.
