Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast—Orange juice, cereal cooked with dates, thin crust, crisp toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Clear soup with noodles, scalloped potatoes and tomatoes, whole wheat bread, pineapple nut dessert, milk, tea.

Dinner—Roast leg of lamb, mint jelly, potatoes au gratin, buttered peas, head lettuce with Roquefort cheese dressing, watermelon sherbet, plain cake, granular bread, milk, coffee.

A leg of lamb is a good investment during the hot weather. It can be served the first day, all cold and served with a vegetable salad cold, the second day, and minced and made into sandwiches on the third day. The meat, of course, must be kept on ice and in a covered container to prevent drying and becoming hard.

Watermelon Sherbet

Four cups watermelon juice, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup water, 1 teaspoon granulated gelatin, 2 eggs (white).

Force the pink part of a ripe watermelon through a fine sieve and measure. There should be four cups. Remove from fire and stir in gelatin softened in four tablespoons cold water. When gelatin is dissolved turn mixture into mold. Let stand until cool. Freeze to a "mush" and stir in the whites of eggs beaten until

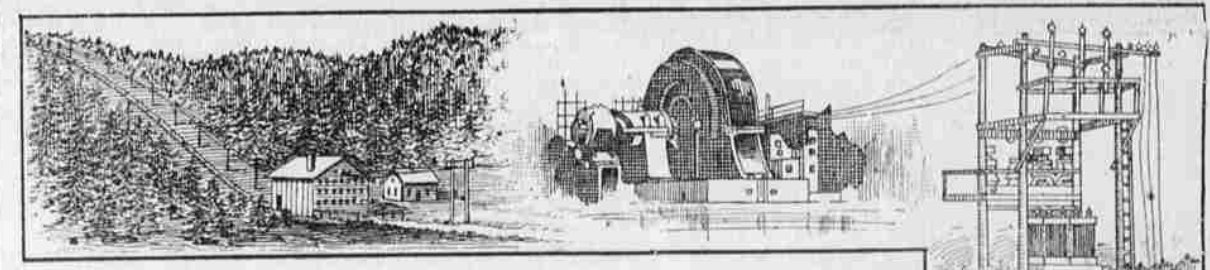
