Claims Wyoming First Glaciated Territory

ROCK SPRINGS, Wyo., (AP)—In the opinion of C. J. Hares, of Denver, a noted geologist, Wyoming was the first section of the country to be covered by the great ice sheet which ages ago surged down from the north.

He considers that the glaciation of Wyoming occurred in the mid-tertiary period, whereas the ice sheets filled the rest of the country in the Pleistocene age. The glaciation of Wyoming was million of years before the present great rivers of the Rocky Mountain region began to flow.

"Two centuries of tertiary glaciation in Wyoming are known," Mr. Hares reported to Western scientific bodies. "The ice must have been approximately 5,000 feet thick and it probably moved forward at the rate of three feet a year, taking more than 200,000 years to spread over the central and southern parts of the state where it left its most apparent traces."

"The tertiary glaciation undoubtedly occupied a very long time in geologic history. It marks a profound change in the climate of that period."

Former Jay Gould Yacht Sold

BELFAST (AP)—Lord Pirrie's steam yacht "Valiant," has been sold to the shipbreakers. The ship formerly belonged to Jay Gould, and made her first appearance in British waters, when the "Vigilant," the American cup defender, came for a series of races with Britannia, which now belongs to King George and is still a leading figure in British yachting.

Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast: Stewed prunes, cereal, cream, crisp grain toast, waffles, milk, coffee.
Luncheon: Cream of tomato soup, eggplants, stuffed cucumber salad, brown bread, cottage cheese, red raspberries and currant jelly, milk, tea.

Dinner: Jellied halibut, steamed milk, shrimp sauce, baked potatoes, ling beans, fruit salad, toasted water crackers, Roquefort cheese, eye bread, milk, coffee.

Children under six years of age should not be served the luncheon salad, the shrimp sauce nor the Roquefort cheese. However, a well-balanced and varied diet is provided for them without the forbidden foods.

The stuffed cucumber salad is a bit out of the ordinary and might be served at a high tea during the summer months.

Stuffed Cucumber Salad:
Two short cucumbers, 12 cup diced sweetbreads, 4 tablespoons minced raw carrot, 1/2 cup green peas, mayonnaise to make moist.

Three cucumbers and cut in halves. Scoop out seeds leaving a cup. The sweetbreads should be boiled and blanched before dicing. Combine sweetbreads, carrot and peas with mayonnaise to make moist. Fill cucumber cups with mixture. Serve on a bed of shredded lettuce and garnish with radish roses and celery curls. The cucumbers should be thoroughly chilled before using.

Expedition to Study Sun's Rays

GENEVA (AP)—It is announced from Zermatt that the Royal Academy of Science at Annecy, France, has planned the scientific examination of the sun's rays from a station on the Gornegrat, situated at an altitude of 9,500 feet. The expedition will be headed by J. Van de Bilt, of the Dutch Academy of Science.

State Monopolies Are Profitable for Poland

NEW YORK (AP)—The establishment of a state monopoly for the Polish government, which is presently announced, will be operated for a period of 20 years jointly by an American and a Swedish corporation, being the number of state monopolies in Poland up to four. The others are alcohol, tobacco and salt.

Revenue from the existing monopolies during the first quarter of 1925, official reports received by the American Polish Chamber of Commerce show, amounted to \$15,000,000. The budget estimate for the current year anticipate total net receipts from the existing monopolies, exclusive of the state monopoly, at \$75,000,000. Profit from monopolies will contribute about 15 percent of the government's revenue this year.

The alcohol monopoly is expected to yield \$20,000,000 in 1925, the first year of its operation.
