Three times Monday E. P. Holmes and Josiah Coombs, attorneys for Simmons, sought to show that their client should be given a 20-day reprieve to allow testimony to prove his innocence to be placed before the state supreme court. Twice Governor McMullen refused to act and once the supreme court itself decided not to intercede.

Before the governor was placed a statement and other evidence that a half-breed Indian killed Frank Paul, Spencer, Neb., garage man for whose death Simmons was convicted in Floyd county two years ago. But in a morning conference and another Monday afternoon, nothing upon which the executive coud base a reprieve was presented.

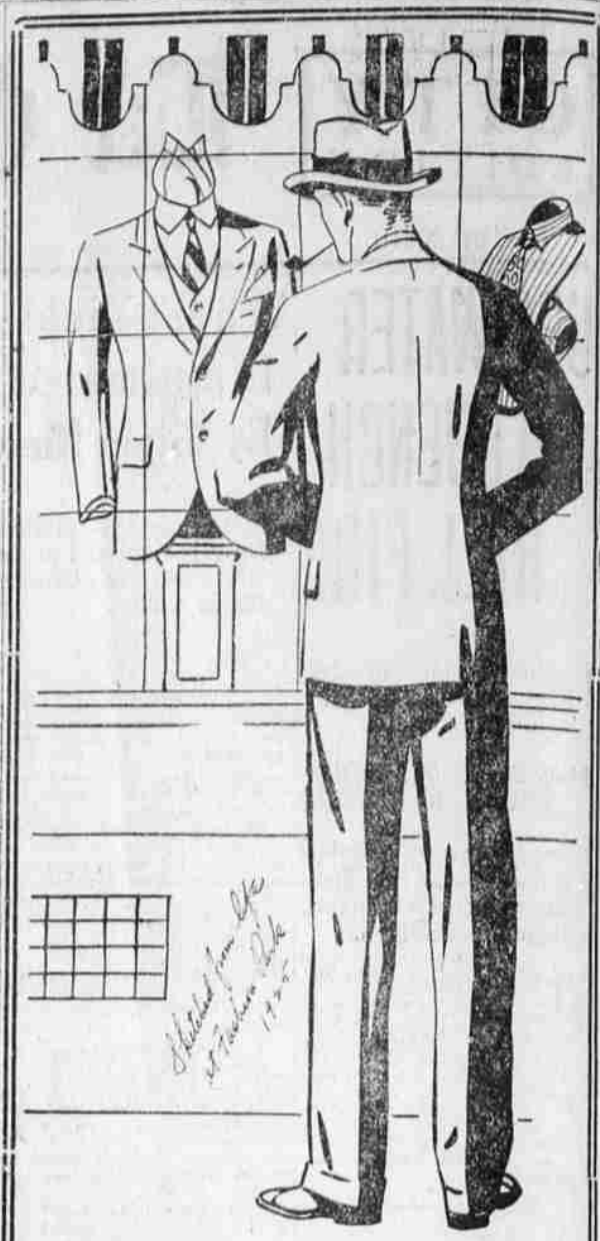
