Health Affected During German Inflation Time

BERLIN, (AP)—That the period of inflation was directly responsible for the retrogression of public health conditions in Germany, was maintained by Dr. Schmidt, the minister of the interior, in response to a query by the Social Democrats in the Reichstag, he declared that the marked improvement of the prevailing conditions of health noticeable a few years after the war was completely nullified by the inflation period of 1923. Especially a marked retrogression of the life expectancy and rickets was recorded.

The number of undernourished and anemic children increased to an alarming degree as the inflation progressed. Shortly after the stabilization of the country's currency, a very pronounced improvement in general health conditions became apparent. The death rate of 1924 and the early part of this year has been surprisingly low, lower in fact than ever before in peace times, or for that matter, in any other country. Today the mortality from tuberculosis in Germany is lower than ever before.

But for all that, declared Dr. Schmidt, the number of children with tuberculosis and rickets is far too great. He described how the government was striving incessantly to improve health conditions among the children of the poorer classes by means of sanitary control and instruction in the schools, but especially with the aid of numerous exhibitions of hygiene and demography throughout the country.

Parts of Bear's Body Used as Health Charms

OLYMPIA, Wash., (AP)—Chinese faith in the curative qualities of selected portions of a bear's anatomy has resulted in several unique assignments for government hunters operating in this state, declares Dr. Glenn R. Bach, field leader for the federal bureau of the biological survey in the Washington district.

Recently, a "chick" resident of Washington, D. C. requested the feet of a bear's gall bladder. In the case of the gall bladder, the information was volunteered that it was wanted as a health charm. Such a talisman when worn around the neck, it was averred, assured the wearer 1,000 years of life.

Although the supposed curative qualities of bears' feet were not disclosed, the hunters have been instructed to forward the first set of bear's feet available to the Olympia office for shipment to Washington. They also have been instructed to use salt unapplied in the curing process. This essential was pointed out in the case of the gall bladder, with the result that the talisman arrived in such a condition that officers were prone to believe that the warmer the weather, the more powerful the charm would prove.

American to Organize Big Reindeer Industry

SEATTLE, Wash., (AP)—W. T. Lopp, chief of the Alaska division of the United States bureau of education for 21 years, left his home here this summer for Barrow, Land, the Canadian island between Greenland and North America, to reorganize the reindeer industry for the Hudson Bay company.

Until this year Lopp was in charge of reindeer throughout Alaska. In the winter of 1924 a party composed of Lopp, Dr. H. J. Jacob, Lieut. E. H. Berthoff, Dr. R. J. Call and Lopp drove a small herd of reindeer 800 miles to Point Barrow, Alaska, from Cape Prince of Wales, on the east side of Kotzeb Sound, to relieve a whaling fleet frozen in and starving.

The first reindeer in Alaska were landed in 1822 at Teller, 50 miles from Cape Prince of Wales. Lopp was brought to Alaska to teach the Indians and Eskimos how to care for the animals. The raising of reindeer has become one of Alaska's biggest industries. The Hudson Bay company plan-
