CANADIANS MAY VOTE IN FALL

OTTAWA, (AP)—While pro- rogation of the Canadian Parliament has been followed by the usual political joll, the possibility of a general election this fall arouses a strong undercurrent of interest.

Expectation of a general election this fall was high until the Labor government of Nova Scotia, in power for 40 years, was defeated in the election in June when the Conservatives were successful in 40 out of 43 constituencies.

In the meantime Premier King has retired to his country home north of the Dominion capital where he can rest and review the situation. His decision with regard to an election this year cannot be very long delayed, as at least 45 days must elapse between the business of election writs and polling day.

In some constituencies members of Parliament already have engaged in campaign work. Arthur Meighen, leader of the Opposition in the Dominion Parliament, and head of the Conservative party, is planning to make a number of speeches in the province of Manitoba. Each election is to be held in the middle of October is mentioned as the most probable time for it.

RUSSIA FACES PERSIAN IRE

BERLIN, (AP)—An official report received by the Persian Legation from Teheran on the recent Turcoman conflicts conveys a bitter arraignment of the Soviet authorities. The Russians are accused of wilfully violating many of the agreements of the Russo-Persian treaty. Numerous instances of non-recognition of existing boundaries in northern Persia are mentioned. Attacks on the Persian border police at Atsepour, Kouschah and Chai and the establishing of Russian border posts on Persian territory are recorded. The worst infringement of Persian inviolability is considered to be the deflection of the driver supplying these villages on the Chorasani border with water. This has been a cause of much suffering among the inhabitants of the district, besides creating serious economic and hygienic disturbances. To all complaints from Teheran, the authorities at Moscow are said to have given evasive and dilatory replies.

JUNKET SAID LIQUOR PARTY

ALPENA, Mich. (AP)—What happened aboard the shipping board steamer Cristobal when she carried a congressional party to Panama in 1921 was related Tuesday in the broken English of the Filipino serving man, Floren Dallo, at the Scott divorce trial.

Dallo's deposition was introduced by counsel for Mrs. Edna J. Scott, who is resisting the efforts of Congressman Frank D. Scott of the Eleventh Michigan district, to divorce her.

"Liquor, she everywhere on the boat after we leave Panama," Dallo said in his limited English. "Bottles were all around, in congressman's rooms and in passenger-ways I see the bottles myself.

When we got back to Norfolk, we cleaned the ship and found lots of bottles in congressman's rooms, sometimes two or three, four bottles in a room, but all empty."

Dallo said at Panama the Cristobal took on about 50 boxes which contained liquor. At Norfolk, Dallo deposited several of the boxes, taken on at Panama, were hauled away in an army truck.

That some of the liquor reached the Washington apartment of the Scotts was indicated by the deposition of Miss Edwin Jones, now Mrs. Ralph N. Butterworth of Washington.

In an effort to turn Congressman Scott's charges of misconduct back upon him, Mrs. Scott's counsel Tuesday brought the name of Miss Jane Kennedy, Mr. Scott's secretary, back into the record.

Dallo, in his deposition, described one occasion in which he found Mr. Scott and Miss Kennedy alone in the Scott Washington office.

In refutation of Mr. Scott's charges of misconduct by his wife, her counsel introduced depositions from Mrs. Clifford Ireland, wife of the former Illinois congressman, and from Mrs. Marguerite Hamilton of San Diego, Cal., formerly of Washington. Both said that Mrs. Scott's conduct with Capt. Wilbur "Jazzbo" Sumner and with Lieut. Don Santelle, was perfectly proper.

Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast—Baked peaches, puff-pan, creamed potatoes, bran and raisin muffins, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Oignon soufflé, coffee, bread and butter, cheese sandwich, apple sauce, molasses cookies, milk, tea.

Dinner—Cold sliced ham, vegetable salad in lettuce cups, scalloped potatoes and tomato and green bean sandwiches, baked turkey potatoes, drop cakes, milk, coffee.

This dinner menu was planned particularly for a porch or garden dinner. The ham and vegetable salad are served on one large platter. The scalloped dish keeps hot most satisfactorily and is the only hot dish in the menu, the sandwiches make the serving of hot food necessary, and the dessert of molasses and cakes are served on one plate in individual service. The dessert might well be served on paper plates. This confined to one plate for each person and the serving dishes.

Baked Peaches Six peaches, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, few gratings nutmeg.

Wash peaches and cut in halves. Pare or not as preferred and remove stones. Place in a shallow pan, cut side up, sprinkle with sugar and pour a little boiling water about 4 tablespoons over the fruit. Add lemon juice and bake about 1 hour in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, with the juice in the pan. The nutmeg is added with the sugar.
