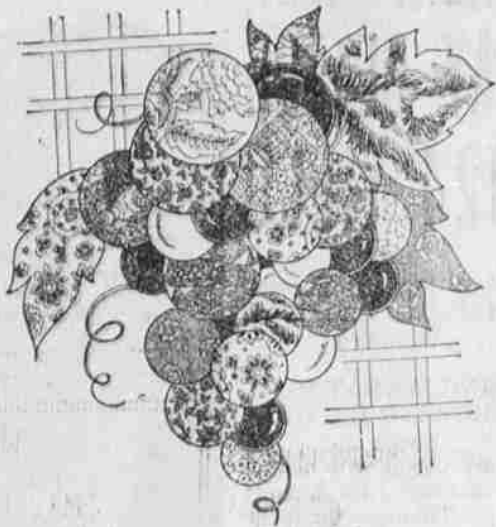

## Billy Evans Says

**JINX TO WALK.**  
When Connie Mack took Eddie Collins from Columbia university and developed him into baseball's greatest second baseman, little did he think that some day Collins would be a managerial thorn to the hopes of the Athletics.

While the baseball world is pulling for Mack to come through with a pennant winner after 16 years of reverses, Eddie Collins, the pupil, manager of the Chicago White Sox, is doing his best to pull him down.

The Chicago White Sox have been the jinx of the Athletics this year. The club chaperoned by Eddie Collins has beaten the sensational A's more consistently than

In between those two great games, the White Sox have defeated the Athletics in a goodly number of regulation affairs. I have often heard Eddie Collins may be regarded Mack as the greatest manager in baseball. I have often heard him give Mack credit for the success that has come to him, yet friendship and admiration mean nothing in baseball.

Collins having won fame as a player, is now seeking to attain similar laurels as a manager and success in a managerial way is determined by the games won column.

**DIAMOND DOPE.**  
The dope goes wrong in baseball oftener, perhaps, than in any other sport. Since pitching is generally regarded as at least 60 per cent of a team's strength, pitching is the big managerial problem.

The failure of a pitching staff to deliver means the absolute collapse of a team's chances. The inability of a star or two to win often demoralizes the entire staff and team. Pitching has been Eddie Collins' greatest handicap in his first year as a big league manager. Just one more winning pitcher would have made the White Sox the biggest underdog of dope in years.

I have seen the Chicago club drop at least 10 games this year that would have been won with ordinary pitching. Lack of proper roster material also played its part. In most of these games Chicago made four or five runs, enough to win the ordinary ball game. In the spring Collins banked strongly on Faber and Thurston. While both have done good work,
