TOWNS SHAKEN IN TWO STATES

BOZEMAN, Mont. (AP).—A slight earthquake shock was felt in Bozeman at 7:59 o'clock on Wednesday night. All sections of the city felt the disturbances and dishes rattled in the cupboards. Electric lights swung on their bearings and there were other visible signs of the tremor. People rushed from their homes to the street and the more nervous and timid were afraid to return. Other parts of the Gallatin valley experienced slight earth movements about the same time and at 2:30 o'clock Wednesday morning shocks were felt in Manhattan, Logan and Three Forks. In the latter town, plaster was knocked from the walls of some of the buildings and there were other evidences of the quake. Manhattan, Logan and Three Forks are the towns which were in the path of the earthquake of June 27 and where the greatest damage was done. School buildings in the three towns were so damaged that a state campaign for funds to repair them in time for the fall school term is now in progress.

DRUG ADDICTS SEEK RELIEF CHICAGO (AP).—Half a hundred narcotic addicts, whose supply of narcotics has been cut off as the result of raids last Monday night in the Canose quarter, Wednesday applied at the federal building for relief, asking to be sent to state or federal institutions for cure. The raids, conducted by federal officials and police, resulted in the arrest of Col. Will Gray, reach narcotic chief here, and three of his agents, who were charged with exchanging narcotics for stolen merchandise. The narcotic addicts declared that conditions were "terrible" since the raids, behind federal officials that some narcotics had slipped from \$25 to \$200 at once, and stating that they must have relief. Many of the addicts will be sent to county jails throughout the state. Meanwhile the police, patrolled Chinatown, after being warned that a large outbreak of looting was likely. All the narcotic courts raided were those of Chinatown members, and this being charged that its rivals, the Hipsters, supplied the government agents with the information that resulted in the raids. Meanwhile the federal agents were investigating the numerous firms of the narcotic ring, with a view to ascertaining just how far it extended. Some officials said it was not only Colonel Canose and his agents, as well as many others arrested in raids were punished Tuesday, on bonds.

Convict Models Yacht SALEM, Ore.—Charles Swift, Harvard graduate, and at one time assistant to John B. Herreshoff, designer of several American yachts that competed against craft owned by Sir Thomas Lipton, has been an inmate of the Oregon state penitentiary since June 20, 1922. This fact became known here when those were received at the executive department a replica of an American racing yacht. The yacht was carved out of a piece of wood. The only tools used by the convict were a dull jackknife and a pin. Swift was received at the penitentiary to serve two sentences for forgery committed in a nearby county.

Argentine Puts Embargo on War Supplies Imports BRUNO ALDES (AP).—President Alvear has signed a decree prohibiting the private importation of armaments and munitions of war into Argentina without special permission from the war department, in which case they are only allowed to enter through the port of Buenos Aires. The decree defines these prohibited imports as those which the nation imports for its own defense and those used by other countries for similar purposes.
