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WORST RAIN IN 12 YEARS HIT'S CITY

ed was that matured and still standing.

Robert Somerville, Ill. reports from Union indicate that no damage and little rain was experienced there but that Alton and Summerville were hard hit. Some wheat and garden truck was damaged near Summerville and Chris Luckland, of Cove, who was near Alton yesterday, reports that about an inch of rain fell there in about two hours time. He reported that he saw very little crop damage near Alton and Cove, however.

At Cove more than an inch of rain fell. The reading in the evening was 57 inches and about the same amount fell during the night.

Robert Witherspoon, of the Union Experiment Station, reports that 32 inches fell at Union before 10 p. m. yesterday and that the damage to speak of occurred near Union.

East of Union, in the mountains near Lathrop, creek a mud cloudburst must have resulted as the creek waters are high and muddy. All forest fires were extinguished. Elgin received little rain and no damage was reported.

Cut Wide Swath.
From reports it is indicated that the path of the storm was along the west side of the valley, hitting La Grande full force and then going northwest, striking Summerville and Alton.

BAKER CROPS DAMAGED.
BAKER, Ore. (Special)—General showers fell in Baker county yesterday. Considerable damage was done to farmers with hay and grain down, grain left in most parts of Whitman national forest, reducing a serious fire risk. Lightning started several local fires, but the situation is not serious.

SCOTT DIVORCE TRIAL FINISHED

Taken care of as the court might deem just.

Soms Scott's Case
Irving S. Cantfield, attorney for Congressman Scott, summarized his client's ground for divorce decree thus:

"That Mrs. Scott, in the fall of 1922, just prior to the separation, had been guilty of serious legal and moral indiscretions."

"That she had abducted herself 'improperly' and 'indelicately' with Capt. Wilbur (Jumbo) Sumner of the United States Air Service; Harry Wyckoff, a clerk at the Wardman Park Apartment hotel, Washington, and with an 'unknown man' whom she is alleged to have met while traveling abroad."

"That she was guilty of such

prostitution and ten months' confinement in the penitentiary during the trial.

In 1914 the tonnage of these vessels was \$2,314,000, while in June, 1925, it was \$7,745,000.

During the last 11 years the seagoing tonnage of the United States has increased by over

7,750,000 tons. In 1914 Great Britain owned nearly 44 per cent of the world's seagoing steel and iron steam tonnage. The present percentage is under 35. The United States now occupies second place with 11,600,000 tons—equal to nearly 30 per cent. The other leading countries are Japan, 3,741,000 tons; France, 2,242,000 tons; Germany, 2,232,000 tons; Italy, 2,334,000 tons; Holland, 2,585,000 tons; and Norway, 2,340,000 tons.

A considerable increase has taken place in recent years of the number of seagoing steamers and motorships of 4,000 tons each and above. In 1914 there were 2,693 such vessels, and now the number reaches 5,962.

Of the total shipping tonnage in Great Britain and Ireland 253 per cent of 1914 (1,000,000 tons) is now 27 per cent (2,693,000 tons). The important nations which have the largest proportion of new tonnage (less than five years old) are as follows: Germany, 60 per cent; Holland, 53 per cent; France, 27 per cent; Italy, 26.7 per cent; and Norway, 24 per cent.
