MOTOR FUEL DISCOVERED

LOS ANGELES, (Cal. City the Associated Press)—A new motor fuel which will revolutionize the automobile industry, was announced before the annual convention here of the American Chemical Society.

Dr. T. A. Boyd of the General Electric Research Corp., latest accomplishment in motor development, said that the engine was the most powerful of its type ever developed, and that the fuel would yield 50 miles to the gallon.

Other claims for the innovation are that it will run at low speeds with virtually the same efficiency as at high speeds and that lack of flexibility, carbon buildup and poisonous fumes will be eliminated, as the motor is more like a steam engine than an internal combustion motor.

The engine, the speaker said, will be manufactured by the General Motors company and installed in its five makes of automobiles.

The fuel, he said, will be manufactured by the Tripart company, while the gathering of the raw material and the distribution of the finished product will be handled by the Standard Oil company.

The synthetic fuel may be made from petroleum, coal or lignite. It will be marketed under the trade name of "Syn-Fuel."

"Light of Western Stars" Scores at Star.

Asin Zane Grey and Paramount have joined hands in glorifying the Great West and the result of their painstaking efforts revealed their last night at the Star Theatre, "The Light of Western Stars" is the rather brilliant title of this new photo-drama, and as is typical of practically all Zane Grey stories, it depicts another glorious, colorful phase of the early, romantic West.

This time it's the Arizona cattle country, back in those ancient days when it was America's main frontier, that provides the background setting for the stirring story of action, drama, conflict and love. From the moment the first introductory Jack Holt as the dapper cowboy, Noah Berry, as the land and chief and Billie Dove as the adorable heroine, the picture grips the interest like a vice and holds it till the final thrilling finish.

All the essentials of Mr. Grey's original story have been carefully preserved by George C. Hill and Milton Haskin, who made the screen adaptation, and with the added advantage of marvelous western backgrounds, the production has an air of realism that is refreshing in its details and significant because of its historic value.

To William K. Howard, the youthful producer, goes the major share of credit, for it is his shrewd and resourceful direction that lifts "The Light of Western Stars" out of the class of the purely melodramatic western into the realm of the epic photoplay.

Although the theme of the story concerns the tough struggle between the forces of outlaws and the forces of law and order, as typified by Berry on one hand and Holt on the other, it gains its dramatic intensity when those two men for love of Miss Dove, the actress reaches a point of tremendous suspense when Berry captures Miss Dove and Holt, and forces the latter to take the "walk of death"—a favorite form of execution at that time, in which the victim is apparently turned loose only to be shot as he takes a dash for freedom. Holt's escape and the starting developments that follow furnish plenty of excitement and some brand new thrills.
