RAILROAD LABOR HAS CONTINUING UNABATED FASCINATION

depress the continent in less time than it formerly took to travel a few miles is no less a feat now that it has become routine.

"Conducting Transportation." The real purpose of the railroad is to carry these passengers, letters or bricks as the case may be from point to point station to station on schedule time and without damage.

This is called by the railway men "conducting transportation." W. Dolous, division superintendent, is the head of this work on the west and division. All train and engine employees are directly under Mr. Dolous and H. J. Coburn and Charles Roberts, his assistants.

Trains are made up that is this cars are put together in the proper order and started in the right direction and on to the La Grande yard, under the supervision of W. N. Shadoe, yardmaster. Mr. Shadoe is responsible for all train movement within the yard limits. This includes spotting freight cars, switching and other train and engine movements. The train crews are also called and other business relative to the train crew is taken care of by the yard office.

While the train is being made up by Mr. Shadoe and his assistants and T. A. McKinstry, chief dispatcher, leaves an order to E. A. Leath, head mechanic, for an engine to haul B. The engine assigned and man and by an engine and train called by the chief at the round house, the train is ready to start.

Most Be Infallible. T. A. McKinstry, chief dispatcher, is responsible for all train movements outside of the yard limits. The crews of dispatchers under his are the men who give the train orders to the engine and train crews by and on. Dispatching is one of the most responsible positions on the whole line. Infallible is in evidence. Orders are transmitted by wire and all dispatchers are expert telegraph operators.

Take the opinion of a chief on the large scale, an conductor as in charge of the train after it leaves the terminal. Orders are given him at the various stations. These are received by the conductors from the dispatchers and all orders must be written so that no possibility for a misunderstanding can exist.

All men employed with the operating department of the railroad are thoroughly examined and found capable before admitted to the positions. For example a trainman must satisfactorily answer a list of 232 questions a conductor or an engineer 730 and a train dispatcher 283. All employees of the road are examined by the trainmen and others entrusted with the movement of trains are the most rigidly tested.

Many Crews on Duty. Two road trains of engines, J. B. Smith and Oscar Green, give instruction to engineers.

At the present time, with heavy normal business, there are 18 train crews in the freight spot and four crews for local service. Approximately 20 sets of crews for freight and 10 engine crews for passenger service are now active on the board. Business on the road is experiencing a slight increase at present.

Lead Crews Posse. One posse went to the ranch house of Mrs. Roy King and sought for hideout between Victor Point and Union Hill, where the woman reported they had seen two men run through their garden. No trace of the fugitives was found there.

An hour later shooting was heard in this vicinity but the investigators failed to determine its cause.
