Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast—Baked pears, codfish puffs, graham muffins, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Salmon timbale, creamed peas, rice cream, drop cookies, apple sauce, whole wheat bread, milk, tea.

Dinner—Stewed chickens with tiny onions, beef potatoes in parsley butter, stuffed tomato salad, maple moussé, sponge cake, whole wheat rolls, milk, coffee.

There are lots of delicious things to make when the cream "turns" or the milk sours. The cream makes the usual amount of shortening unnecessary so butter is saved.

The hour cream drop cookies are good for a picnic or afternoon tea. All nuts or all raisins or dates can be used or these "goodies" can be omitted entirely.

Sour Cream Drop Cookies.
One-third cup butter, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 2 eggs, 1/2 teaspoon soda, 1/2 cup heavy sour cream, 3 cups flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg, 1/2 cup raisins, 1/2 cup nut meats.

Cream butter and beat in sugar. Add eggs well beaten. Mix and sift flour, salt and baking powder. Dissolve soda in sour cream and add alternately with dry ingredients to first mixture. Add flavoring, raisins and nuts finely chopped. Drop by spoonfuls onto a buttered and floured baking sheet and bake twelve minutes in a moderate oven.

Cuban Aviator Wins Honor For First Parachute Jump

HAVANA, (AP)—Lieutenant Guillermo Maribel, the Cuban aviator who on July 4 made the first parachute jump seen in Cuba from a Cuban army airplane, has been decorated with a military medal and two Havana newspapers have started subscriptions for a fund to give him a house.

Maribel first asked President Machado to authorize him to take up an obsolete plane on May 29, Cuba's independence day, set fire to it and drop in a parachute. The president thought this too risky a stunt and disapproved it. Maribel then requested permission to make a jump from a plane driven

by a pilot. The president approved the request and, as a mark of respect to the United States, set the date as July 4.

Maribel dropped from a biplane at about 4,000 feet into the Gulf of Mexico. A swarm of small craft were stationed off shore to effect a quick rescue.

Spitzbergen Villages Exist as Friendly Foes

NY-AALISUND, Kings Bay, Spitzbergen, (AP)—To talk to Norwegians about Kings Bay is to invite trouble. They insist the name of the settlement is New Aalisund, because it is owned by a Norwegian Coal Company, whose headquarters are at the old city of Aalisund on the west coast of Norway.

There is much good-natured rivalry between the two Norwegian settlements, Long Year City and Ny-Aalisund. The former boasts the most northerly church, the latter prides itself upon the most northerly railway in the world, just below the 72nd degree north latitude. The familiar sound of a locomotive whistle breaks the Arctic stillness with an eerie effect. The track is only a couple of miles long, and connects the local mine with the pier.

There is not a tree in the whole of Spitzbergen, but botanists say that there are 130 species of flowering plants to be found in the short Arctic summer.

At Ny-Aalisund were the only examples of carefully tended graves. Two mounds on the bleak

land behind which Armandson's polar expeditions suffered, cover according to inscriptions, the remains of a young mother and a two-year old child.
