LATE EVENTS OF IMPORTANCE

BABSON PARK, Mass. (Special).—Rover W. Babson states that three very significant events have just happened which he believes business men and investors should carefully consider. These three factors are:

- (1) Changes in the flow of gold. (2) Wage cuts of 10 per cent. (3) Important price reductions.

In discussing these three events, Mr. Babson states as follows: Higher Interest Rates Probable. "The balance of trade, that is, the difference between the merchandise which the United States buys of foreign countries and that which foreign countries buy of the United States, was for many years in favor of the foreign countries. Some years, such as 1921 and 1922, this balance was very much against us, although it was gradually working around in our favor. During the ten years preceding the war, the balance of trade was in our favor except a few months during the years 1909 and 1910 and again during the year 1914 as shown by the following table:

Sugar Consumption Registers Increase First Six Months

CROCKETT (Special).—More sugar has been eaten by the American people in the first half of 1925 than ever before in the history of the country, according to figures just received by officials of the California and Hawaiian Sugar Refining corporation here. The total quantity distributed between January 1 and June 30 of this year was 6,696,289,000 pounds, or an average of 53.5 pounds for every one of the 114,000,000 population of the country.

This is an increase of more than \$2,500,000 pounds, or about two and a half pounds per capita over the record for the first six months of 1924, and is more than twice the country's consumption no longer than 1900.

The showing to date, it is announced by the sugar men, indicates that the total consumption of the United States during 1925 will be more than 12,000,000,000 pounds, or more than 100 pounds per person for the whole population.
