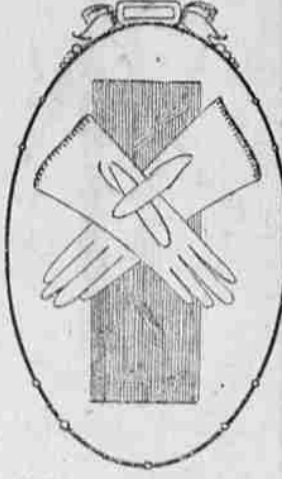

Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast—Stewed blueberries, oval thin cream, graham toast, soft cooked eggs, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Scalloped potatoes and eggs, lettuce sandwiches, baked pears, cup cakes, milk tea.

Dinner—Casseroles of fish and vegetables, creamed string beans, cucumber jelly salad, baked apple dumplings, rice bread, milk, coffee.

This casserole dish suggested in the dinner menu reduces the number of fish's needed for the meal. Potatoes are baked separately but are served as a border to the fish. Carrots, onions, celery and parsley are cooked with the fish and mushrooms may be added if convenient.

Potatoes sometimes fall if cooked too often the same way. The dish suggested in the luncheon menu is nourishing and somewhat unusual.

Scalloped Potatoes

Four good sized potatoes, 2 hard "boiled" eggs, 1 cup heavy cream, 1/2 cup milk, butter, 1 tablespoon made mustard, 4 tablespoons buttered crumbs, 2 tablespoons grated cheese, salt and pepper.

Peel potatoes and cut in thin slices. Put half the potatoes into a well-buttered baking dish. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and cover with half the eggs in thin slices. Put with bits of butter. Mix cream, milk and mustard. Pour half of this mixture over potatoes and eggs. Add remaining potatoes and sautéing eggs and pour over the rest of the cream mixture. Cover with buttered crumbs mixed with grated cheese and bake in a hot oven until potatoes are tender. It will take about fifty minutes. The dish can be covered during the first half of the baking. The cover should be removed to crisp and brown the crumbs.
