Fraternity Delegates To See West Pointers

NEW YORK (AP)—An exhibition drill by cadets at the United States Military Academy at West Point, will be given for the benefit of visiting delegates to the national Phi Beta Kappa convention to be held in New York City, September 8 to 10, the arrangements committee has announced. A steamboat will carry the delegates up the Hudson to West Point.

Among the business matters to come before the delegates, representing the 99 chapters of the organization, are applications for new chapters from Xavier South College, University of South Carolina, College of Wooster, University of South Dakota, Occidental College, University of Idaho, University of Kentucky and the University of the South.

Arrangements also will be made for the semi-centennial to be held next year in honor of the original charter which was established in 1776 at the College of William and Mary. The organization has already 57,761 members, of whom more than 40,000 are living.

Prevent Antelope Slaughter

BROADBENT, Mont.—C. W. Walter, Henry Sturver and Gene Hanks have been appointed honorary game wardens by State Game Warden Robert H. Hill. All three men reside in the Little Belt region and on the upper Snake River country and in the game preserve. The appointments were granted with a view to discouraging the slaughter of antelope from the country in which they have ranged for so many years past.

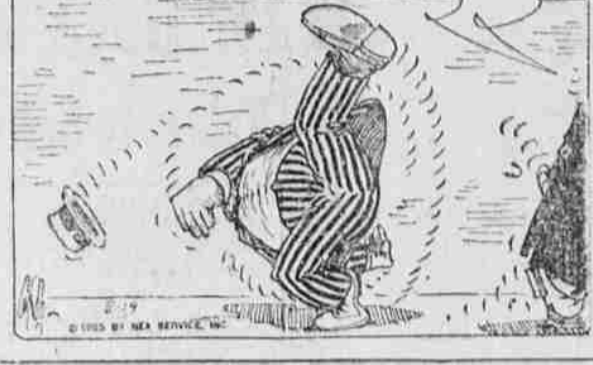

League of Nations Looks for New Fields

BUENOS AIRES, (AP)—Colonel James Proctor has completed a tour of the interior of Argentina on behalf of the Labor Bureau of the League of Nations in order to investigate conditions for settling what are estimated to be more than 200,000 Russian and German refugees. The Labor Bureau plans to send them to South America countries in order to relieve some congested districts in Europe, especially the Voiron region in Russia.

In a memorial presented to the Argentine secretary of agriculture, Dr. Lebraton, High Commissioner Proctor says that the Labor Bureau of the League of Nations is studying the possibility of directing a flow of Russian and German emigrants to other countries where the labor is scarce.

After expressing appreciation for the courtesies extended by the Argentine authorities, the memorial says that the Labor Bureau wants a close cooperation with the Argentine government in order to facilitate the entrance of emigrants into Argentine and that such emigrants would only be sent after proper guarantees are obtained concerning their labor value and morality. The bureau asks the Argentine government to send information and instructions regarding the selection of emigrants.

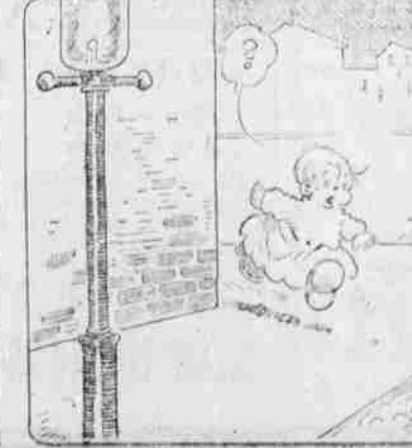
