FRANCE IS TO TRY STANDARD

WILLIAMSTOWN, Mass. (AP)—France is determined to revert to the gold standard, Robert Mathon of Paris, French banker, said Monday night in his fifth lecture at the institute of politics on "The French 1920-1925 of France."

Whether she was to revert to her pre-war standard or stabilize the franc at a new but lower value was yet to be decided.

In either case, we must begin by stabilizing the currency, and the preliminary measure was the final balancing of the budget, an increase in taxation to attain that object; a careful financial policy, involving increased public debt and making provisions for its reduction; a settlement of the international debt question and a confirmation of faith of thirty nations.

M. Mathon described the present inflation as due to advances made by the Bank of France to the treasury during the war and armistice period.

The Polish "corridor" between Germany and East Prussia, acquired by Poland under the peace treaty and a present cause of friction between her and Germany, was again discussed by Dr. Ferdinand M. Schmitt, who asserted that the only mistake at the Paris conference was to apply the boundary line too far to the west.

Alfred Vagts of the institute of international affairs in Hamburg, attacked the economic argument for Poland's possession of the corridor. Only from 3 to 6 per cent of Poland's exports, he said, had passed through the port of Danzig in recent years, the greater part of her foreign trade passing through the land frontier, while of Danzig's imports but 8 to 12 per cent were going to Poland proper.
