SWEDEN NATION IS PROSPEROUS

STOCKHOLM, (AP)—Eighty percent of Sweden's larger individual income taxpayers reported increased revenues for last year, as did two-thirds of the country's leading business corporations.

The largest individual taxpayer was A. M. Veinberg, a factory owner, whose income was \$402,254. Others who followed him closely were Marcus L. Wallenberg, the international banker, and Ivar Krogner, head of the Swedish match trust.

Among the corporations the biggest return was filed by the Swedish Tobacco Monopoly, showing an income of \$5,462,424. This, however, was a decrease from the previous year. The next largest returns were filed by the Swedish Match Corporation and the Swedish Liquor Monopoly.

Former Irish Leader Dies BELFAST, (AP)—Edward M. Clayton, a former assistant inspector general of the Irish revenue, who died at St. John's hospital, Dublin, was with several English ministers, included in a list of persons whom a Cork jury held shared the responsibility for the slaying of Lord Mayor MacDonnell.
