BIG GAINS IN SHIP TONNAGE

LONDON, (AP)—The new edition of Lloyd's Register of Shipping shows the world's gross tonnage owned in June, 1925, to have been 84,641,418 tons, of which steamers and motorships total 42,356,274 and sailing vessels 2,261,042. In 1924 the total tonnage was 64,622,567, of which 31,514,140 tons were steamers and motor ships and 2,309,427 sailing vessels.

During the 12 months from June, 1924, to June, 1925, there was an increase in the steam and motor tonnage in the world of 864,251 tons, and a decrease in the sailing tonnage of 248,385 tons, making a world net increase of 615,866 tons. In Great Britain and Ireland the increase amounted to 334,875 tons, in Italy to 195,449 tons, and in Norway to 175,249 tons. A considerable reduction is, however, shown in the United States tonnage, which was 579,457 tons less than 12 months ago.

There are at the present time under construction in the world 23 vessels of between 10,000 and 20,000 tons each and nine of 20,000 tons and upward. There are also under construction 53 steamers and motorships, each of over 1,000 tons, for the carriage of oil in bulk. Seventeen of the 32 larger vessels are building in Great Britain and Ireland.

PLANS TO IMPROVE ROAD

WILBUR, Wash.—District Highway Engineer Guy Harvey has forwarded plans to Olympia which provide for a 19-mile stretch of grading and surfacing with crushed rock on road No. 22 from Inlander lake to Dillion bridge. It is expected that the contract will be let next fall. The right of way has been cleared.

Surfacing with crushed rock has begun on state road No. 22 between Daisy and Bessel. Condensation action has been substituted against the property of Mr. and Mrs. H. Hollinger on the Columbia pier to hurry the work on this road.

The \$10,000 concrete bridge at Latah will be completed in about a month.

NEW HOSPITAL LEASED

TOLEDO, Ore.—The new Lincoln hospital, just completed last week, has been leased for five years by the board of directors to the Pacific Spruce corporation. The hospital was built by popular subscription, the total number of shares being a heavy subscriber. The hospital is located on land contributed by the Pacific Spruce corporation adjacent to the new mill and will make possible a much better medical service to men injured in the mill. Previously the nearest hospital facilities were at Corvallis or Albany and required a two hours' automobile trip. Drs. Hellwarth and Kaufman are in direct charge of the hospital.

EPWORTH SESSION ENDS

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore.—The annual Epworth league institute for the southern Oregon district closed here with 50 to 600 delegates in attendance. The ten-day session was pronounced the most successful and most largely attended ever held. The delegates praised Cottage Grove as a delightful and hospitable city. The delegates made their home on the Methodist conference camp ground during the session.

Dr. L. M. Hargett, Kansas City evangelist, preached at all the main services and delivered several inspiring messages for the young folk. Ministers in attendance spoke at the forenoon and midday services. The institute will be held here again next year.

Japanese Adapted to Fasting

TOKYO, (AP)—Hideo Takahira of the Tokyo Nutrition Laboratory, recently achieved the degree of doctor of science from Keio university for presenting a thesis on "The Adaptability of the Body of a Japanese." For many years Mr. Takahira has been studying the subject and has experimented on himself, abstaining from food for from three to four weeks. In his thesis the scientist argued that a Japanese is able to fast without harm for a period of 50 days.

Breakfast—Fresh apricots, creamed salt fish on toast, eye nut, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Rice loaf, lettuce sandwiches, apple sauce, molasses cookies, milk, tea.

Dinner—Broiled lamb chops, mashed potatoes, creamed onions, molded spinach salad, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

A dish of apple sauce and a cookie or plain cake should be substituted for the shortcake for children under six years of age. Otherwise the menu can be served on a platter.

Rice Loaf

Two cups boiled rice, 2 medium sized onions, 1 green pepper, 1 cup finely chopped nuts, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tomatoes, 2 cups white sauce, parsley.

Dip pepper into boiling water and let stand five minutes. Plunge into cold water and rub off the thin coating. Remove seeds and mince finely. Melt butter, add pepper and onions, sauté and minced. Cover and cook over a low fire until tender. Add to rice and nuts. Mix thoroughly. Wash tomatoes, cut in halves and scoop out pulp. Remove seeds from pulp and add to rice mixture. Rub inside of tomatoes with salt and fill with rice mixture. Put remaining rice into a buttered casserole, making depressions for each tomato. Add tomatoes, cover and place in a pan of hot water. Bake in a hot oven for forty-five minutes. Remove from casserole to a large hot chop plate, pour around sauce and garnish with sprig of parsley.

Or the loaf may be served from the casserole and the white sauce served separately.

Vienna Forns Welcoming Club

VIENNA, (AP)—An organization known as the "Welcome to Austria Club," has been formed under the patronage of Dr. Michael Hainisch, the president of the Austrian republic. The members make it their task to receive foreigners coming to Austria, to show them about the town, arrange social meetings and act as interpreters for them. The federal chancellor, all ministers and the captain-generals of the provinces are honorary presidents of the club. The club will consider it its duty to render the stay of foreigners in Austria as pleasant as possible.

English Celebrate Anniversary

Of Signing of Magna Charta

LONDON, (AP)—A service held recently on the spot where the famous Magna Charta was signed, commemorated the 710th anniversary of the signing of Magna Charta.

Many members of the clergy, Boy Scouts, fire fighters, representatives of friendly societies and hundreds of others marched for two miles from the village church of Kingham across the Mead to the Old Windsor End, where speeches were made in the enclosure by the Right Rev. Bishop Darlington, of Hereford, Pa., and Sir Joseph Cook, the high commissioner for Australia.

Nearly 1,000 men attended and with broad heads they requested the following prayer to be said:

"We praise Thee, O God, for the great deed in this place 700 years ago, whereby the laws and liberties of this realm were defended against tyranny and a victory was fought for justice and freedom."
