Large Boats of French Line May Quit Havre as Home Port

HAVRE (AP)—This city, especially its shipping circles, is agitated because of the possibility of the French Line taking its de luxe boats to Cherbourg, leaving only the smaller boats and cargoes to port at Havre. There has been much contradictory talk concerning the scheme, but it is now admitted that it is more than rumor. The United States Line, it is said, has made proposals to the Havre authorities to dock their boats at this port, being unable to come to terms with Cherbourg. This would be an excellent thing for local trade, but would also be close competition for the French Line.

It is said the chamber of commerce at Cherbourg intends to build new quays in the Mille-creek in such a manner that three or the largest vessels could dock at the same time.

Musical Comedy in English Falls to Attract Cubans

HAVANA, (AP)—Experiences of several American musical comedy companies here this year have proved that the field for English language artists in Cuba is very limited. One company came from New York with a contract for four weeks and other guarantees. After playing to slender houses for two weeks, the theater manager informed the company that there was not enough money in the treasury to pay salaries. Efforts to collect expenses also failed. The entire company of 18 was stranded and unable to get funds. The American Club staged a benefit at which nearly \$500 was raised and a local theater was donated rent free for one night.

Two other companies were more fortunate. They had enough money on hand to pay their hotel bills and steamship passages home.

Fire Destroys Farm Home

ALMIRA, Wash.—A farm house, occupied by the family of Charles Koronec, near Piqua, and owned by J. V. Johnson, Almira, was burned. Mr. Koronec and his eldest son were away harvesting.

Mrs. Koronec had returned home from town with a quantity of groceries, which she had unloaded and stored in the house, when one of the children complained of a smell of smoke. The mother arose and opened a door leading to a shed and flames leaped into the room.

Although badly burned about her face and arms, Mrs. Koronec hurried her children from the house. She then started to walk barefooted to neighbors for help. She was cared for and brought here to a doctor. The family is making headquarters in an old cellar.

Mr. Johnson sets the loss of the building at \$2000. Plans are under way by the Almira Civic club, to furnish food and clothing for the family.

Auto Turns Over; Woman Hurt

SAVED FROM SUICIDE PACT

TOKYO. (AP)—Another case of "shinju" is attracting considerable attention in the Japanese newspapers. "Shinju" is a word meaning the double-suicide of lovers whose future seems hopeless. In the recent tragedy the "man in the case" was Shintaro Kitazato, son and heir of Dr. Baron Kitazato, famous Japanese physician and inventor. Young Kitazato did not succeed in the attempt to end his life, but the girl, a beautiful Geisha, was found dead.

The body of Kitazato was discovered by a fisherman in Lake Chuzenji with several gashes in the throat which later proved not to be serious. The would-be suicide told the police he had fallen in love with a geisha and that because he was already married, they decided to commit "shinju." According to the young man, they tied themselves together and threw themselves into the deepest waters of the lake where the girl soon succumbed. Kitazato, however, decided at the last moment he did not wish to die and, struggling desperately, succeeded in untying himself from the geisha. He said he managed to swim to shallow water but when there, overcame with remorse, and feeling that he was in duty bound to accomplish "shinju" he slashed his throat with a pocket knife.

Drive Car Into Live Wire

WALLA WALLA.—R. H. Brown drove his automobile into a broken trolley wire, carrying 6000 volts, and had the presence of mind to let go of the steering wheel and keep his feet off the pedals.
