### MORE WATER DESIRED.

PENDLETON, Ore.—A proposal to double the present storage capacity of the Pendleton water system by erecting two more reservoirs on the north hill, having a capacity of 1,000,000 gallons each, was made at the meeting of the water commission. Discussion that followed the making of the proposal met with the approval of the members present.  
The construction work could be done without floating a bond issue. Superintendent Phelps told the commission, and the work will have to be done before long in the care of the increasing demands for water.

In brief, the story deals with the experiences of a small town boy, who returns home after having "made good" in New York. At least, the townspeople take it for granted that he has been successful inasmuch as his business cards read "President of the Amalgamated Oil Co." The citizens hail his arrival with the keenest delight because the town is at that very moment in the midst of an oil boom.  
At about the time the local "hero" discovers that a couple of crooked promoters are in back of the oil boom, the inhabitants are startled that their native son is in reality a failure and bankrupt. The resultant developments are full of action and suspense, eventually leading to a surprise climax and a happy ending.  
The production as a whole receives great credit on Tom Geraghty who made the screen adaptation and Victor Herman who produced it.  
A late news reel and a Yale are also on the program.

### Hoot Gibson Tames the West At Star Theater.

An amusing sketch of an Easterner in the West utterly unconscious of the fact that he is a fool, is presented by Hoot Gibson in his latest release, "Taming the West," a Universal-Gibson Special, which opens at the Star theater today for a three-day showing.  
The picture is a virile out-of-

doors story jammed with fast action, built around a well-knit plot and embellished with cleverly thought-out incidents.  
Hoot Gibson is given many opportunities for showing his versatility as a star in Westerns. To his famous ability with horses he has added some roaring auto racing scenes to "Taming the West." Gibson is as clever with the steering wheel as he is with the bridle.

**BOISE SETTLERS PAYING U. S.**  
BOISE, Idaho.—Thirty-four settlers on the Boise reclamation project made payments today on their delinquent drainage assessments. It was reported at the office of the Boise project. This reduces the number of delinquent users to 81, including the 35 who refused to make any payment or comply with a court order to give the government a prior lien on their crops, and as a result are without water.  
Many of the settlers are paying in full, Karl H. Miller, chief clerk of the project, announced. All payments are accepted and if for the full amount of the delinquency the liens are released. If the payments are only partial the lien is credited accordingly and a reduction made on the lien.  
Settlers continue voting for creation of irrigation districts on the project to obtain the relief afforded under the act-finders' act. Today a check of the votes showed 1049 operators of 1142 farms want district organization, while but 24 are opposed.

### BRIDGE WILL BE BUILT.

HOOD RIVER, Ore.—Word has been received here from Cascade Locks that work will be resumed within the next six weeks on an interstate span across the Columbia river just below the Cascades, where, according to Indian legend, the Bridge of the Gods once stood. The company owning the Klamath-Pasco bridge across the Columbia, which recently took over the proposed Cascade bridge, has let the contract for construction to the Union Bridge company of Portland.  
The new bridge, to be of the cantilever type, will be 160 feet high. The center span will be 40 feet wide, in order that nighters may stop and view the rapids. The approaches will be 20 feet in width.
