Sister Mary Says:

By Sister Mary
Breakfast—Baked apples with cream and cream, scrambled eggs, crisp whole wheat toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Creamed celery on toast, cranberry bread with raisins, rice and pear pudding, milk, tea.

Dinner—Sliced cold roast veal, baked potatoes, corn on the cob, tomato and pineapple salad, floating island, rice bread, milk, coffee.

Rice and Pear Pudding
Six or eight small pears, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 cup water, 1/2 cup rice, 1 tablespoon butter, 2 cups milk, 2 eggs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 lemon, 2 preserved cherries, 2 tablespoons cherry syrup, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Pare, cut in quarters and core pears. Make syrup of sugar and water, add pears and cook until tender. Add cherries and syrup if wanted and remove from the fire. Keep hot until needed. Wash rice. Put in top of double boiler with milk, 1/2 cup water, salt and butter.

Add to the boiling point and then cook over hot water until tender. Add yolks of eggs well beaten and remove on a large deep plé dish.

making a depression in the center, fill with pears and sirup. Cover the whole with the whites of the eggs beaten until stiff and dry with 4 tablespoons sugar.

Bake in a slow oven for fifteen minutes to cook and brown the meringue. Sweet pears will not need one cup of sugar in the syrup in which they are cooked. Two-thirds or three-fourths cup will make the dish sweet enough.

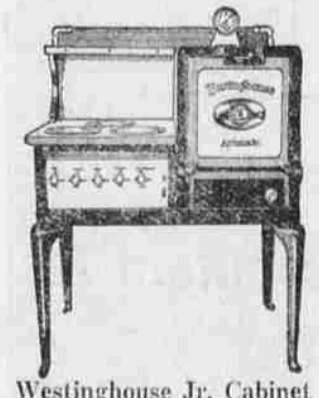

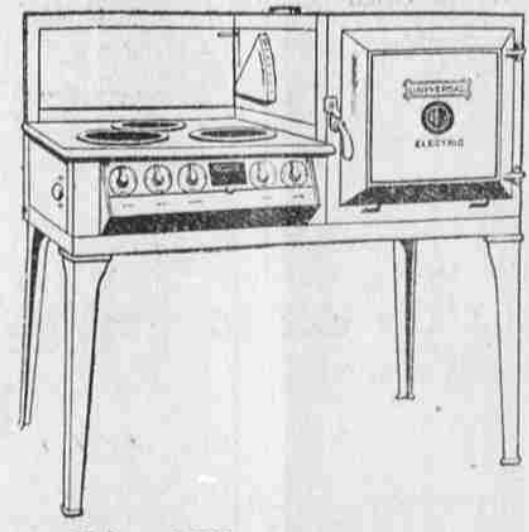

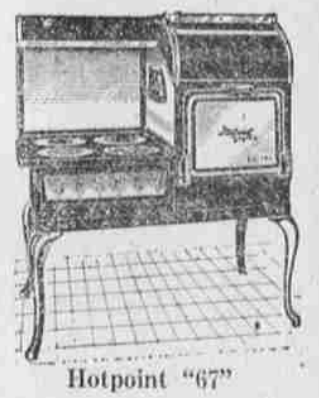
