"The property of the country is such at this time that we ought to get what we did last year. I don't see much on the report from the International Apple Shippers' association. It is a buyers' concern, and it is unreliable so far as the apple producer is concerned. There is a smaller farm crop than last year. The commercial apple crop is slightly more, and this ought to be increased, consequently because of the shortage of farm crops. Washington is the only state with an increase over last year, except Idaho. All others have less, or about equal to last year."
