BRAZILL GOES BACK A NOTCH

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal. (AP)—By the Associated Press.—Taking advantage of the home lot during the past week, "Lefty" O'Doul, Salt Lake outfielder, added seven points to his batting average and has a long lead over Pacific Coast league hitters. Official figures including games of yesterday, show the free fly catcher at .420 average.

GETTING BREAKS
Getting the breaks help greatly in winning ball games. Successful teams always seem to be favored with the breaks, but these breaks seldom get them. "Getting the breaks in baseball is largely making them," says Ty Cobb.

Winning teams appear to be lucky and losing teams unlucky. In reality winning teams make much of their luck.

"A team must take chances to get the breaks. Winning teams take them, gamble with fate, but losing clubs rarely do."

If losing teams instead of scrambling about their tough luck, spent the same amount of energy trying to do things on the ball field, they would be more successful.

The winner is always the optimistic, the loser the pessimist. Defeat-shatter confidence while victory makes for more of it.

Luck does play a prominent part in baseball, but luck is more than mere good fortune, it is a condition that is usually created by the efforts of the team that gets it.

AMERICAN GIRL RETAINS TITLE OF TENNIS QUEEN

FOREST HILLS, N. Y. (AP)—Helen Wills turned back the challenge of Kathie McKane, one of British women players and won the national tennis championship for the third straight year. Monday. The match, played at the Westside stadium, was an spectacular contest as has ever been witnessed.

The 19-year-old American girl did not retain her laurels without a struggle. She lost the first set to the slim British star, but came back after that to sweep her rival aside with as devastating and exhibition of powerful stroking as any woman player has ever shown. The final score was 6-0, 6-0, 6-2, decisive enough in the end, but it fails to tell the vivid story of amazing speed of stroke and courageous aggressiveness that carried the young title holder to the greatest victory of her career, a triumph that left her supreme as queen of American courts and gave her possession of the big all-star champion trophy outright.

ROCKNE LAUDS GRID CHANGE

DETROIT (AP)—Because the ball is to be kicked from the 40-yard line this season rather than from midfield, one of the greatest thrills in football, the return of the kick-off, will be more frequently experienced and the game will be a lot more fun for the fellows in the stands and for players as well, in the opinion of Knute K. Rockne, coach of the Notre Dame eleven, writing in "The American Boy."

A major result of the decision of the Football Rules Committee, in starting the kick-off from the 40-yard line without the tee, will be that teams will develop a strong kick-off return, said Mr. Rockne. He believes this play will take part in the 1925 campaign. He will devote time in drilling his team in the return of the kick-off.

Coach Rockne declares the "recommendation of the Rules Committee that high schools be played in four 12-minute, instead of 15-minute quarters, "is a mighty wise one." The average high school team is not as husky and well-conditioned as a college or university team, he says, and eleven of fourteen fellows should profit by this advice.
