### Actress Sets New Style In Clothes.

"Always have the colors of your clothes blend with the color of your eyes."

That's the advice of Alma Rubens, motion picture actress, who is coming to the Arcade theatre on Wednesday in First National's new picture, "Fine Clothes."

"My eyes are brown, with a tinge of grayish blue," she cites as an illustration. "My very best color, then, is brown—any shade of it. I often wear gray, but it must blend toward brown, being more of a taupe than a steel gray. Black, too, must have a brownish, rather than a bluish, cast."

"There is so much brown in red I find that is one of the best of the vivid colors. Purple with enough red in it is another color of mine and in the brighter, lighter tints, orchid, pink, yellow and orange are best."

"I never wear blue. It isn't for me, but is just the thing for one whose eyes blend with it."

"It seems fairer to use the colors that are yours rather than those that belong to someone else, for we spoil the whole effect by wearing something that is not becoming."

"Blue-eyed people should only wear shades of blue and any color that has blue in it. Yellow would never be for them, nor brown, but green with enough blue, purple in which blue predominates and blue gray are all excellent."

"The green-eyed one may trespass upon the color province of either her brown or blue-eyed sister, though all colors with green predominating are the most becoming of all."

"Black eyes can follow well with brown, only there will not be such a wide range of becoming colors."

### INCREASE WATER RATES

MEDICAL LAKE, Wash.—The council passed an ordinance raising water rates from \$1.25 for the first 1000 gallons and 15c for each additional 1000 to \$1.50 and 20c. The new rates will take effect September 1.

A. A. Reynolds asked the council to vacate street and alleys on his property, as the property is at the outskirts of town and the streets and alleys are never used. The council plans taking action at the next meeting.
