Sister Mary Says:

By Sister Mary
Breakfast—Steamed prunes, whole wheat cooked cereal, toasted rolled extra bread, butter, soft-boiled eggs, thin cream, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Cream of tomato soup, croquettes, apple turnovers, pudding, plain cookies, tea, milk.

Dinner—Roast beef, potatoes baked with onion, brown gravy, creamed cauliflower, apple-coriander salad, bear Bavarian cream, coffee, milk.

The roast beef should be rare but not unappetizingly so. Children are often very sensitive to too rare meat and refuse to eat one of the most valuable meats for no other reason than this. If the roast is a delicate pink in the center, the meat is easily digested and not too attractive.

Pear Bavarian Cream
One cup pear pulp, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon gelatin, 8 tablespoons cold water, 1 cup whipping cream, 2 tablespoons powdered sugar, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, few grains salt.

Put very ripe juicy pears and cut in quarters. Remove the cores. Rub pulp through a coarse strainer. Add lemon juice and sugar. Soften gelatin in cold water and dissolve over hot water. Stir into pear mixture. Stir frequently until mixture begins to jelly. Fold in cream, whipped and sweetened with sugar and flavored with vanilla. Turn into mold and let stand on ice two or three hours to become firm and thoroughly chilled.

Cream of Tomato Soup
Four medium-sized tomatoes, 1 small onion, 1 tablespoon minced celery leaves, 2 tablespoons salt, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 teaspoon soda, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 tablespoon flour, 2 cups milk.

Peel tomatoes. Peel and cut onion in thin slices. Melt the butter in soup kettle, add onion and cook over a low fire for five minutes. Add tomatoes and seasonings with 1/2 cup cold water. Cover and cook 20 minutes. Melt remaining butter, stir in flour and slowly add milk. This tomato mixture through a coarse strainer, stir in milk and hot milk. Heat very hot but do not let boil.

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Hints for the Housewife

RICE PUDDING THE CHILDREN WILL LIKE
Mothers realize the healthful properties of rice and its importance in a child's diet, but often find that the simple methods of serving it boiled or as a baked custard become monotonous and distasteful. By combining it with fruit it takes on an entirely different appearance which is sure to appeal to the child's appetite. And although its flavor is also changed, it carries the same amount of nutriment—in fact more, because fresh fruits are long healthy.

This pudding which is easily prepared, can be served as a main luncheon or supper dish for children, and with a few added touches becomes a dainty dessert for the grown-up.

Boil one cup of rice in a quart of salted water until very soft. Drain the rice, add a cup of milk, and then cook until it is like mush. Add a tablespoon of butter, half a cup of sugar, a tablespoon of lemon juice and a little of the grated rind, and two well-beaten eggs. Arrange in a well-buttered enameled ware baking dish, place halved ripe peaches over the surface, with a split blanched almond in each cavity, if desired. Then brush over the melted butter and sprinkle thickly with powdered sugar. Bake in a hot oven about thirty minutes. For the children, serve it plain, either hot or cold from the dish in which it is baked.

For the grown-up, prepare a hard sauce as usual, beat well, then fold in some peach pulp to flavor well, also if desired the stiffly beaten white of one egg.
