A. Phillips, president of the association, presided. It was decided to appoint a committee of three to visit the markets at Portland, Seattle and Spokane and make a careful study of the contemplated move. Establishment of these firms, it was said, will be contingent upon the failure of the present marketing plan to render satisfactory service. The committee of three has not been appointed.

### "The Chorus Lady" At Sherrys Today And Tomorrow.

"The Chorus Lady" which comes to the Sherry Theatre for a two-day run today in an adaptation of the James Forbes play of that name in which Rose Stahl scored such a sensational success some years ago.

This play is considered one of the five greatest Broadway productions. Several "classic lines" had their origin in it—among them "It's always a bum season for bum shows" and "It's the woman who pays and pays and PAYS!"

The screen version develops along the same lines as did the play; there is the same daring on the part of the heroine, the same rise and fall of emotions. But Stanley King who wrote the scenario has modernized the story to the extent of making the "lady" a typical "collier's" girl of today.

As played by Rose Stahl, she was a faculty, nondescript type with occasional moments of temper, but most of her "business" was put over in a simple, sophisticated manner.

Margaret Livingston brings the "lady" up to date by making her a simple, blushing, non-loving creature—the product of a jazz-mad age on the surface and a noble, self-sacrificing woman beneath the surface.

The splendid cast includes Virginia Lee Corbin, Alan Roscoe, Lillian Elliott, Lloyd Ingraham, Philo McCallough, Kaye Southern and Maxine Leroy.

The "bummy bee" spends more time in the five than she does outside hunting nectar. She only makes 21.85 trips during her lifetime and gathers only eight-tenths of a gram of nectar.

### Four Great Actors In One Screen Drama.

One of the greatest casts of actors ever assembled appears in the picture, and each is portrayed by a veteran of the stage and screen; the quartette including Lewis S. Stone, Percy Marmont, Raymond Griffith and William F. Monck.

Stone, who plays the part of the heart of Bohemia, has been on the stage since 1901, when he made his first hit in "The Misleading Lady." He continued his work on the legitimate stage until 1915 when Thomas H. Ince gave him one of the leading roles in "Honor's Altar." Since that time he has never left the screen, and during his ten years in motion pictures has built up a reputation for being one of the finest actors in the industry.

Marmont's stage career started at the age of eight, when he played Charles Darnay in "The Tale of Two Cities." From that time till 1918 he played on the London stage in Shakespeare, Dostoevsky and Massfield plays. His first smashing success in pictures came in his interpretation of Mark Twain in "Winter Comedies." Since then he has played in many successes, including "The Great Heart," "The Light That Failed" and "Daddy Goes A-Hunting."

Although Griffith is the youngest member of the four he has been an actor as long as any. His first role was when, he was only 15 months old. Since then he has been in the profession in some phase or another continuously; has played "Little Lord Fauntleroy," a girl in "Ten Nights in a Barroom,"

### belonged to a French pantomime troupe.

Among the fourth of the quartette, is playwright as well as an actor. Before entering pictures he was on the stage for eighteen years. He has played in many successes, including the screen version of his own play, "The Day Before," "The Connecticut Yankee," "The Name Is Woman" and "Rouge Me."

"The Clothes" is an adaptation from Franz Molnar's stage success, "Fashions for Men," and was produced by John M. Stahl for Louis B. Mayer.

The story is built around a London shopkeeper whose life ambition is to get out of debt and finally collapses on the eve of his wedding when his wife opens with an account of her past life. His best friend deserts him and a member of the English nobility seeks to complete his education by lighting a new love which burns in his heart.

### Coal Plays Big Role in International Politics

BERLIN, (AP)—Coal still rises in Europe as an important political and economic negotiation between the nations. Around it revolve many problems of industry, unemployment and diplomacy, with Germany, France, Poland, Lithuania and the Saar district all affected to a greater or less extent.

Recently coal proved the most important factor of a German-Polish controversy. Poland insists upon Germany taking a monthly allotment of 250,000 tons of Polish coal, whereas the German government has sympathetically fixed the maximum of Polish coal imports at 100,000 tons.

The semi-official Deutsche Informationsbehe Correspondence pointed out recently the significance of coal as a political factor and cited how, in the economic negotiations, how the problem of the Saar coal mines, the deliveries of war reparations coal, the growing importance of German coal in solving the acute iron ore many other similar developments all tended to place coal in the center of political discussions.

Unemployment in England has been attributed here, to a considerable extent, to the reaction that set in after their period of coal prosperity, enjoyed while competing fields in Germany's Ruhr district were involved in settlement of war preparations.

### SPRING SOWINGS GOOD

McMINNVILLE, Ore. — Practically complete loss of all fall-sown crops because of severe December frosts, in part offset throughout Yamhill county by generally favorable reports from spring sowings in a general survey of harvest results made here.

The crop as a whole is below normal but good quality and yield considering the time of planting. Small crops such as berries, peaches and garden products are reported good. Prunes suffered from the freeze and extreme dryness later cut down the yield.
