By WILLIAMS LIVESTOCK MEN ASK CHANGE IN LAND POLICIES

SALT LAKE (AP)—Stabilization of the livestock industry through elimination of the insecurity and uncertainty resulting from federal policies on the public lands, with suggestions as to what will and what will not work to this end, was urged upon the senate committee on public lands and surveys by spokesmen for a joint conference of cattle and wool men representing these interests in 11 western states at a hearing before the senate sub-committee here Wednesday.

Senator R. N. Stanford of Oregon, committee chairman, and Ralph H. Cameron of Arizona, John B. Kendrick of Wyoming and Tasker L. Oddie of Nevada, members, composed the official body before which was adduced testimony prepared by the livestock interests in support of their proposal that the public lands question, as it affects this industry, be settled finally and fairly after more than 20 years of uncertainty and variant policies. Frank J. Hamon, president of the National Wool Growers' association; E. C. Bixby, president of the American National Livestock association; and P. R. Marshall, secretary to the National Wool Growers' association, were the witnesses heard.

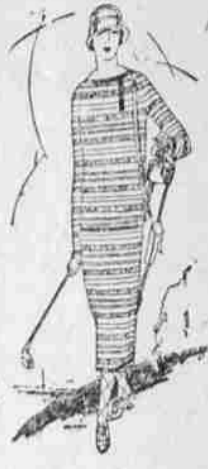

CANADA WANTS 8-HOUR DAY

OTTAWA (AP)—An eight-hour day, enacted by legislation, will be urged at the 43rd annual convention of the Trades and Labor Congress the first week in September. This organization is to Canada what the American Federation of Labor is to the United States. In addition to the eight-hour day other matters to come before the convention include all age pensions, immigration and unemployment.

The eight-hour day, at present is extensively in force in Canadian industries but by agreement rather than as a result of legislative action. There is a question as to whether this legislation should be enacted by the Dominion Parliament or the legislatures of the different provinces. Dominion law officers have held that the eight-hour day was a question for provincial and not federal legislative action and when the question was over to the nine provincial governments, British Columbia was the only one to take action, confident on the rest of the Dominion following suit.

Even the legislature in Quebec on the question was referred to the province court of Quebec which decided that the only jurisdiction of the Dominion Parliament is to legislate on the eight-hour day in regard to servants of the Dominion government, and to further not within the bounds of any province. For the remainder, which comprises the industrial (public, private) to legislate the with the provincial legislatures.

It is expected that the Trades and Labor Congress convention will take the stand that the Dominion government should amend legislation for an eight-hour day within the limited jurisdiction as defined by the supreme court ruling, when it is agreed would lead the way to similar action by the provinces.

What the provinces need is a way to the 18 1/2 between eight hours and even hours and half hours.
