There probably will never be any story-book character more appealing—especially to the feminine mind—than a good bad man, a beloved outlaw, a generous bandit. For that reason, if no other, "The Deadwood Coach," the William Fox production, which opens on Friday at the Star theatre, is destined to be popular.

It begins with a day when, as a little boy, he saw his father hanged by a renegade cattle rancher and dedicated his life to avenging his death. From that day on, "The Orphan" was known as the most dangerous character in a
